NO SMOKING IN KENTUCKY

The Flying Squadron, which will soon make a whirlwind campaign through the state of Kentucky, will it is thought, take up the matter of a state-wide law prohibiting the use of tobacco in any form. At the recent annual meeting of the Kentucky Woman's Christian Temperance Union, held in Winchester, Clark county, strong resolutions were passed by the convention, opposing the use of the weed on the grounds of morality and the general benefit of the people. The Flying Squadron will probably follow this lead and it is likely that prohibition of the use of both liquor and tobacco will be discussed and advocated. Many states have anti-cigarette laws practically all of which are dead-letters as far as enforcement is concerned—but no state yet has passed a sweeping law against the use of tobacco in any form. As Kentucky is one of the great tobacco-raising districts, it will be interesting to watch the results of an attempt to prohibit its use in that commonwealth.
