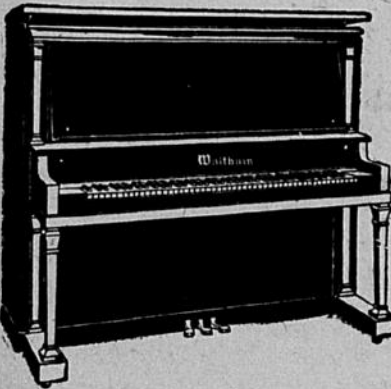

Deadly Chemical Bombs.

Hydrocyanic acid, known as prussic acid, is so poisonous that a mere breath of it means instant death.
