It will be seen from this that there are but three precincts, Mortons Gap, Charleston and Richland, out of 26, in which there were no Prohibition votes at all, and all this, too, without a single Prohibition speech or rally of any kind. This simply shows what a rousing vote might have been gained, had the Prohibitionists only made the least effort; but the Prohibitionists at the county seat allowed themselves to be caught in a trap this year, by following the advice of licensed party leaders instead of those of their own political faith. Perhaps by the time they have grown older they will have become wiser on this line. Neither Democrats nor Republicans take advice from Prohibitionists in regard to their own party machinery, and Prohibitionists ought certainly to be as capable of managing their own affairs.

The flimsy pretext set up that on account of the local option election coming off, all Prohibitionists must become "dead corpses" politically and must not even say "boo" on the subject of Prohibition, for fear of "bringing politics into the local option election," while the parties that issued this imperial edict used whiskey and beer by wagon loads to secure votes, is the absurdest of all absurdities. We venture the assertion that there has probably never been an election in this county when there was such a wholesale use of liquor for political gains as in the campaign just closed.

We certainly hope these people will keep their promise and vote "dry" at the local option election. The Prohibs have fulfilled their part of the contract by "keeping mum," and now let "the party of the second part" keep theirs.

In 1900, after an active campaign, Hopkins county gave John G. Wool-

ley 82 votes. It means much that there has been even so small a gain with no campaign work at all, and we close as we began by saying this shows what possibilities were in store if the Prohibitionists had followed the advice of their own party leaders, instead of those of license parties who used the local option election as a scare to elect their own candidates.

The National Convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union will meet in Cincinnati tomorrow, in the Ninth Street Baptist church, for its thirtieth annual session.

An exceedingly interesting program has been prepared. Among the noteworthy features besides the regular reports of the National officers, will be an address from Mrs. Maria Wood, representing the interdenominational council of women, on "The Menace of Modern Mormonism;" one from Mrs. C. C. Faxon, a Woman's Christian Temperance Union missionary, who will tell of her work in Manila; one from Deaconess Sarah J. Elliott, representing both the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and the Interdenominational Council of Women on "Polygamy in the United States," one from Mrs. Mary L. Orr, Woman's Christian Temperance Union missionary telling of her work at the immigrant station at Ellis Island; one from Miss Olive Christian Malvery, of India; one from Mrs. Mary H. Hunt, national superintendent of scientific temperance instruction, who will give a report of the ninth international anti-alcohol congress at Bremen, Germany, last June, and one from the brilliant Miss Belle Kearney, of Mississippi.

Hon. Seth Low, who resigned the presidency of Columbia University, two years ago, to become mayor of Greater New York, has become a wiser man as a result of his mayoralty. He came to the office possessed of the idea that an executive could guess at the wishes, rights and duties of his constituency better than he could find them in the law. In his campaign for re-election he frankly abandoned that position, finding that it pleased nobody and was inseparable from corruption. In speaking of the excise law he says, "Payment of money determined the administration of the excise law. This was the system I was elected to break up. It has involved an administration of the excise law that many of you do not

like, but I am prepared to say, after my experience of the last two years that no other administration is possible without restoring the intolerable conditions from which the city has been freed. I used to think otherwise, but then I had not come in close contact with the conditions that Tammany had created all along the line."

This culmination of such a conspicuous attempt to combine the three separate departments of government into one is regarded by prominent leaders of thought as the beginning of the end of the doctrine that "a wicked law or a crooked theory of interpreting a law is cured by electing 'a good man' to do the business."
