JUDGE BLUE DEFEATED

By Hon. Lee Gibson by Large
Majority—Hopkins Coun-
ty Man Wins by 3,700

Unofficial returns show that
Hon. Lee Gibson, of this county,
has won the nomination for Cir-
cuit Judge by a majority of
about 3,400 over Judge Blue, of
Murion, and it is thought the
official vote will increase this to
about 3,600.

In the race for Commonwealths
Attorney, J. Elliott Baker, of
Fincetown, drew the nomination
over Ed Young and Ruby Laffoon
of this county, his majority be-
ing estimated at about 500 votes.

Mr. Laffoon carried Hopkins
county, receiving about 1,700
votes. Mr. Young ran third in
this county receiving 700 votes.

Returns in the race for Judge
of the Court of Appeals have
been hard to obtain and will
probably take the official count
to determine the winner. Judge
Gordon stated yesterday at noon
that his majority this side of the
river was 6,00 over Thomas, but
that he had been unable to secure
the vote from the counties in the
lower part of the district. Judge
Gordon carried this county by a
good majority.

unofficial vote published on the
page giving his majority as 15
Hon. H. F. S. Bailey was an
easy winner, for Representative,
his majority over Judge Brady
being about 700 votes. Min
Wilson received 297 votes in the
county.
