Peace Proposals

Meyer London, Socialist congressman from New York, has a peace program much more elaborate than that of Mr. Ford. If the latter gentleman's is too vague to be practical, we fear that Mr. London's is too specific and too good to be possible. He proposes a conference of neutral nations, from which shall issue a demand that the war be ended on the following terms: The evacuation of all conquered territory; a referendum in Alsace-Lorraine, Finland and Poland to settle form of government and allegiance; freedom of the seas; emancipation of the Jews; gradual disarmament and a permanent court of arbitration. Mr. London will seek to have Congress approve this program by resolution.

VICTIM OF ACCIDENT

L. L. Fogg Fell Under Train in Yard and His Foot was Amputated

Louisville, Ky., Dec. 4.—L. L. Fogg, chief dispatcher for the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company at Nashville, Tenn., suffered the amputation of the left foot and other serious injuries last night when he fell under a passenger train in the L. & N. yards. He lives at 634 Floral Terrace, this city.

Mr. Fogg came here from Nashville two days ago to visit his wife and children, and intended to board the 9:40 train for Nashville last night. Officials of the L. & N. believe that he boarded the wrong train and attempted to jump off while the train was in motion. He was found by Leon Wilson, a switchman, and removed to St. Mary and Elizabeth Hospital. Dr. Yandell Roberts states that he has a good chance to recover. Six years ago Fogg was employed with the Associated Press in this city. He is forty years of age.
