

Labor Trouble.
STREUVILLE, OHIO, July 9.—Trouble is brewing at the Market-street coal shaft. The directors of the company say they can no longer pay two and one-half cents per bushel for digging, as during the past year they only cleared \$1,000 on 1,000,000 bushels of coal, without counting wear and tear of machinery, &c. They say if the miners do not accept a reduction they will be compelled to shut down the works. On the other hand, the miners claim that they cannot work for less money and support their families. A committee of miners held a conference with the directors but nothing definite was decided upon.

CINCINNATI, July 9.—Freiburg & Workum's whisky house on Main street was completely consumed by fire, together with the most of its contents. The origin of the fire not definitely ascertained. Loss supposed to be \$50,000; partly insured.

Rye flour quiet at \$3.40 @ 3.85. Sales to-day were as follows: 100 bbls family at \$4.65. Corn was strong, and higher rates were asked both for spot and futures. Car lots of No. 2 mixed sold at 52c, and there were buyers at the same rate at the close. No. 3 mixed held at 51c, and ear corn sold at 48 @ 51c, according to sample.

Wheat had a somewhat better tone, buyers being willing to pay \$1.02 for regular No. 2 red, and sellers asking \$1.02 1/2 @ 1.03. Choice hard scarce and held at \$1.05. Sales as follows on the floor: 200 bu red sample, landing, \$1.03 1/2; 500 bu choice red in elevator, \$1.04. Oats had a better tone, selling at better rates. No. 2 mixed brought 36 1/2 @ 37c in elevator and No. 2 white 42 1/2 @ 43c, the inside rate being a sale last evening. In the open market 800 bu No. 2 white, spot, sold at 42 1/2 @ 43c, and 800 bu light mixed at 37c. It was not believed that the present rates could be sustained. Buyers regard the market prices as too high, and hold off for a decline.

Rye was dull and easy, being offered at 54c in elevator for No. 2; 2,500 bu No. 2 August sold at 54c.
