

CONDENSED NEWS.

GENERAL GORDON left Berber, continuing his journey to Khartoum.

GEORGE PARSONS, importer of toys, at No. 12 Park Place, New York, has made an assignment.

ADMIRAL HEWITT has despatched a letter to Tokar encouraging the garrison to hold out and promised speedy relief.

ADMIRAL PAUL MOTH has been ordered to succeed Admiral Galibee in the command of the French fleet at Madagascar.

THE wages in some of the ship yards at Essex, Mass., have been reduced from twenty-five to thirty-five per cent.

THE striking cotton weavers, of Blackburn, England, have accepted the reduction in their wages and will resume work on Thursday.

T. P. & S. S. SMITH, shoe manufacturers at 825 Arch street, Philadelphia, have failed. Liabilities approximating \$363,000; assets not known.

A RECEIVER has been appointed for the Jones Car Manufacturing Company of Schenectady, N. Y. Liabilities \$200,000. The judgments were for \$128,000.

THE Board of Directors of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company have elected Elisha P. Wilber to fill the vacancy caused by the death of President Harry E. Packert.

BRADSTREET reports the failure of Edward Pittsberry & Sons, at New Orleans, with liabilities of \$140,000. The assets are not available, being scattered in Central American ports.

THE Berlin Post asserts that Gladstone's policy is to gain control of Central Africa, while pretending that he reluctantly entered the Sudan because he is compelled to interfere.

THE authorities of the province of Victoria, New South Wales, have offered the Queen's Government two gunboats and a torpedo boat, owned by the province for service in the Red Sea.

VICE ADMIRAL H. R. H., the Duke of Edinburgh, has received a favorable answer to his request that the Government assign him to the command of the Naval Contingent in the Red Sea.

THE Commissary General of the English forces in Egypt, accompanied by officers of the Egyptian Engineer Corps, has started for Assiout to prepare suitable accommodations there for military stores and for a reserve force of troops to be called upon in case of disaster to General Wood at Assiout.

Fatally Beaten by Thieves.

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Policeman Oliver V. Stewart, of the East Twenty-second Street Station, died Saturday evening at his residence, No. 337 East Ninth street, from paralysis. He was 49 years of age, and had been on the force nearly fourteen years. Last summer when returning from Rockaway beach Stewart noticed several thieves on the train attempting to rob a passenger and his family. He went to the passenger's assistance and was severely beaten about the head by the thieves, one of whom he arrested and brought to this city. The injuries then received caused, it is said, the paralysis which led to Stewart's death.

A Test Suit.

LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 14.—A suit has been commenced by the Board of Church Extension of the Nebraska Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church in the State of Nebraska against J. D. Johnson. The papers were filed to-day with the Clerk of the District Court to recover possession of certain real estate in the city of Lincoln. It is proposed to make this a test case, and, if it succeeds, to bring several others. The real estate called in question is valued at many thousand dollars.

Gladstone's Cabinet.

BERLIN, Feb. 14.—The National Zeitung predicts there will soon be a reconstruction of Gladstone's Cabinet, in order to secure unanimity of opinion upon the policy to be pursued in regard to the Sudan.

Grain Markets.

CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—Wheat opened weak and with every indication of selling off considerably but only fell 1/2c below the opening. In the active option in the early part of the day the market was featureless, at the lowest point it was strengthened by the big scalpers in provisions and quickly growing strength in the corn pit, but the advance was not maintained owing to a desire to realize. Corn opened weak and fell off a fraction in nearly all the options, but the heavy buyers soon came to its rescue and made the market boom, owing to a desire to realize, outside figures were not maintained. Oats were active, closing firm at nearly outside prices. Provisions steady, selling 1/2c below the opening early in the session, quickly recovering under liberal purchases by heavy speculators, the active option in pork going up 3/8c with other meats recording a proportional advance. Closing prices on Call: Wheat active and firmer, 95 1/2c February; 95 1/2c March; 97 1/2c April; \$1 02 1/2c May. Corn strong and higher, 55 1/2c March; 55 1/2c April; 60 1/2c May. Oats steady and higher, 37 1/2c March; 37 1/2c April; 38c May.

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Flour—The feeling is a little stronger, with more reserve offerings; shippers are doing little, and the demand from local trade is limited: shipping extra, \$3 35@3 60; round-hoop Ohio, \$3 35@3 50; St. Louis extra, \$3 35@3 50; city mill extra, \$5 10@5 50; winter wheat extra, \$3 35@3 60; Minnesota extra, \$3 35@3 60; Southern flour quiet but firm at \$3 40@3 50. Wheat opened 1/4@1/2c lower, subsequently advanced 1 1/2@1 1/4c and reacted 1/2@3/4c; trade mainly on speculation; scarcely any export or city milling demand; spot ungraded winter red, 96c@ \$1 12 1/2c; No. 2 red, \$1 09@1 13; do March, \$1 09@1 10 1/2; do April, \$1 12 1/2@1 13 1/2; do May, \$1 15 1/2@1 15 1/2. Corn—Options opened slightly lower, recovered and advanced 1 1/2@1 1/4c, closing firm at a shade under the outside figures; spot lots stronger;
