THE Relief Committee, yesterday, received a liberal donation of provisions from Mr. J. S. Pogue, of Mayslick.

THE relief depot will be closed this evening as it is considered there is no longer a necessity for keeping it open.

THE north side of the west pier of Limestone bridge fell last night leaving the structure in a dangerous condition for heavy travel.

THE damage at the bridge will not interrupt street car travel. The cars are running as usual, though passengers will have to walk across the bridge until next Monday.

MR. JOHN RATCLIFFE, aged 92 years, one month and sixteen days, died at Grayson, Carter County, on the 18th, inst. He was born in this County January 2, 1792.

MESSRS. MYALL & RILEY have sold the agricultural department of their business to Messrs. McIlvaine & Humphreys. They will continue in the business as undertakers.

THE farm of Mr. Sam M. Poyntz, comprising 180 1/2 acres, offered at public sale, Thursday, was withdrawn at \$149 an acre, which was a very low price, considering the quality of this land and the value of the improvements.

A writer in the Cincinnati Commercial Gazette says: "Let me offer the suggestion to parties with inundated premises, that in drying them out they will accomplish more in twenty-four hours by leaving all doors and windows open, in addition to having good steady fires, than they would in a week by having fires alone and keeping the premises closed. This is for the purpose of allowing the evaporation of vapor to escape, otherwise it settles down again in the form of dampness."
