MRS. WILSON WILL REDUCE SCALE OF LIVING IMMENSELY

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Mrs. Wilson, wife of the president; Mrs. Marshall, wife of the vice president, and the wives of members of the cabinet have agreed to reduce their scale of living to the simplest possible form in order to set an example to other women of the country.

To do their part in the movement for the conservation of the nation's time and resources, the women of the highest official families will omit the usual formal entertaining and calling and reduce to the minimum their social activities, so they can give more time and money to constructive preparedness and relief work. They agreed to pledge themselves to buy inexpensive clothing, simple food and to watch and prevent all kinds of waste. Today they informally appealed to all the women of the country to join them, not only as individuals but by organizing to prevent possible suffering later on.

Mrs. Wilson and Miss Margaret Wilson, the unmarried daughter of the president, are now paying more attention to the details of the management of the White House establishment than ever before. Miss Wilson is also singing in concerts for the benefit of the Red Cross.

FISHERIES OF ALASKA OPPOSE EIGHT-HOUR DAY

JUNEAU, April 12.—Telegrams of protest from fishing companies against the application of the eight-hour law to the fisheries industry poured into the territorial legislature today. Objections to the bill are based on the scarcity of labor and the pressing demands of the government for the largest pack possible. The house today tabled a bill abolishing capital punishment.

HEAVY FIGHTING CONTINUES AT VIMY

(By United States Cable)

WASHINGTON, Wednesday, April 25.—The British armies in France are now engaged in some of the heaviest fighting of the war, on the last eight miles of front from Vimy Ridge to below Croisilles.

The Germans are throwing their full force into resistance along the River Scarpe but have lost many positions, the British taking over 1,000 prisoners.

BERLIN SAYS ENGLAND SUFFERS DEFEAT

BERLIN, Wednesday, April 25.—The war office asserts that England's might has suffered heavy sanguinary defeat through the foresight of general headquarters and the tenacious desire of the German troops for victory. Only on Cambrai-Arras road did the British gain ground yesterday, says the war office.

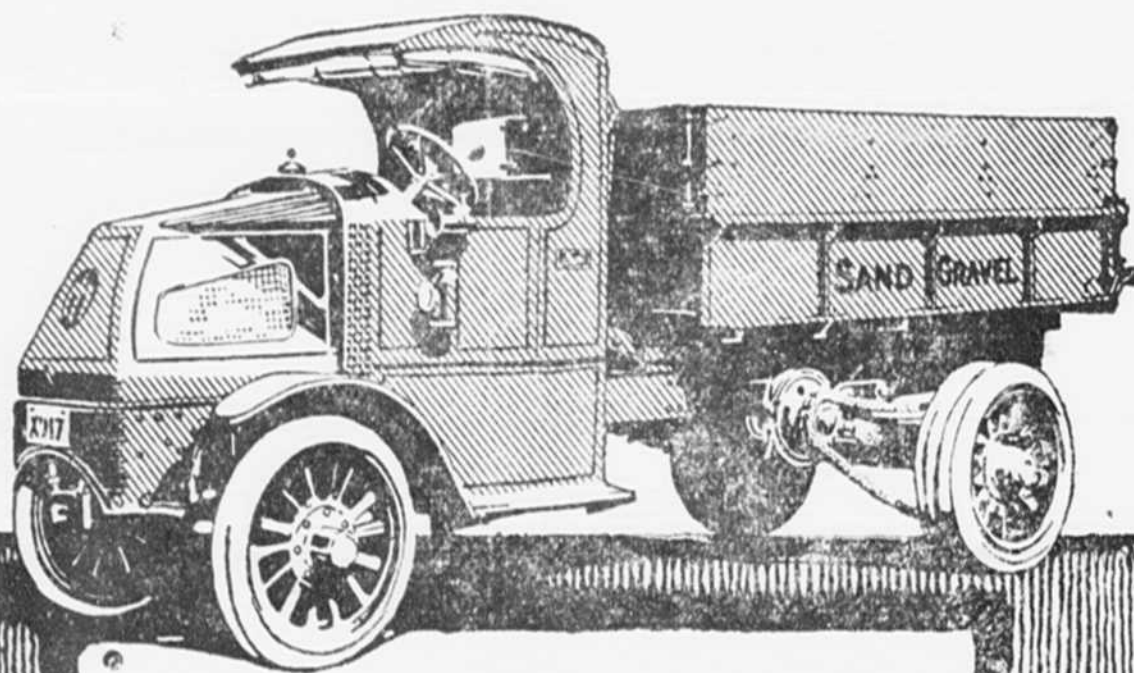

On their refusal, the young man went into the next room and swallowed the acid. Medical help was immediately called and the boy's life was saved.

TRAIN ROBBER ON WAY TO PRISON, LEAPS FROM CAR

CHARLOTTE, N. C., April 12.—Henry Grady Webb, sentenced in West Virginia to a term of twenty-five years in the penitentiary for train robbery, escaped from his guards here while being taken to the federal prison in Atlanta. While the train was standing in the shed at the passenger station Webb jumped through a window.

Webb was arrested at the Electric Medical College in Kansas City, Mo. He had been recognized by James C. Wright, a classmate, from a photograph sent out by federal inspectors offering \$1,000 reward for his capture. Webb and three other men robbed the Baltimore & Ohio train October 9, 1915, at Central Station, W. Va., getting \$100,000.
