

THE WATER BOARD'S ACTION

With Respect to the Water Board's Action

ENUMERATES ITS OBJECTIONS

To Allowing the Company to Lay Water Pipes

Has received in 5,000 feet of pipe which the Water Board has ordered to be laid.

The action of the Board of Water Commissioners, at the meeting yesterday afternoon, with respect to the laying of water pipes, along the right of way of the P. & W. Railroad Co., was the subject of a communication to the Board of Directors, which was adopted and sent to the Board of Commissioners.

The city of Wilmington having outgrown its old water system, has entered upon the execution of a new plan for providing an adequate supply of pure and wholesome water, and in doing this has regard to the daily consumption of water by the city's largest consumers.

It is manifest that no city can have an efficient and wholesome water supply unless it can depend upon a constant and uniform rate of supply and consumption. If any person or corporation is allowed to have an independent water supply, then any number who may desire, would have an equal claim upon the city authorities for the institution of their own private water supply, and theoretically at least, no one would be taking a backward step, which would result in increasing the burden upon others not capable of providing for themselves an independent supply of water.

To grant these individual rights would materially interfere with and overburden the water supply of the city, and the Board of Commissioners, in the way of the legitimate progress of the city, great or small, yet we are unwilling to grant to any one concessions and privileges which would relieve them of any part of their fair and legitimate burden in support of the municipal improvements so necessary for the good of the public.

There is already a spirit of unrest at the manifest inequality in the burdens of general taxation which have grown out of the vast increase of property holdings of railroad companies and other public corporations, without the corresponding proportionate increase of taxation for the support of the county and city government. We hold it to be fundamentally wrong for a community, and much more for public servants, to give away valuable rights and franchises without corresponding and adequate benefits, and especially is this true when the spirit of the special privileges asked for as in this case, strikes a severe blow at the prosecution and completion of the plan already entered upon for providing an adequate system of water works, which has entailed a very considerable outlay for supplying the railroad company as well as other corporations and citizens with a sufficient quantity of good water.

The board adopted a resolution refusing to withdraw its objections and requesting the Street and Sewer Department not to allow any person or corporation to lay pipes in the streets to supply water.

Bids for 5,000 feet of eight-inch pipe were received as follows: J. K. Dimmick, \$31.50 per 100 feet and three cents a pound for specials; R. D. Wood & Co., \$30 and 25¢ cents for specials; United States Cast Iron Pipe and Foundry Co., \$31.15 and 3 cents for specials. They were referred to the chief engineer.

The balance in bank was reported to be \$48,038.78 to the credit of current expenses, besides a special fund of \$115.50. The weekly payroll, \$1,995.01 and monthly payroll, \$1,545.35, were approved and ordered paid.

WRANGLE OVER BIDS.

At the Meeting of the Board of Education Last Evening.

At the meeting of the Board of Education last night, a spirited discussion characterized the opening of bids for the plumbing, heating and gas fitting at the new school being erected in the Ninth ward. After all other business had been disposed of, Secretary Guthrie reported that, acting under instructions from the committee on heat, fuel and ventilation, he had advertised for proposals for the plumbing, heating and gas fitting to be opened last night and that four bids had been received.

Mr. O'Donnell stated that he was a member of the committee and had not been notified of the meeting of the committee when the plans and specifications were considered and bids advertised for. He did not think it was showing him the proper courtesy.

Mr. Tadmor thought the member should have been notified of the meeting and moved that the bids be returned to the committee.

Mr. Carter, chairman of the committee who was presiding in the absence of President O'Donnell, stated that the committee had nothing to do with the bids, as they were then in the hands of the board.

Mr. Brown stated that the work is needed at the new school and should not be held up.

Dr. Cooper suggested that the board take a recess of five minutes to see if the matter could not be adjusted by the committee. The members of the committee are Messrs. Carter, Brown, Sullivan, O'Donnell and President Strickland.

A recess was taken, but no satisfactory agreement was reached. Mr. O'Donnell desired to see the specifications, but the architect, E. L. Rice, Jr., did not have them with him.

When the board reconvened Mr. Carter asked what was going to be done about the bids. Architect Rice stated that unless the work is started soon it may be a question as to what the specifications call for. Mr. O'Donnell said he was willing to have the bids opened. The bids were as follows: Brison Heating and Plumbing Co., \$5,670; Jenkins Co., \$3,840; Lawton & Co., \$4,047; Harry A. Miller, \$3,766.

On motion of Mr. Baynard the bids were referred to the committee, with power to act.

It was the opinion of several of the members that hereafter specifications should be brought before the active board.

The resignations of Barbara A. Forrest of No. 19 School and Virginia W. Lettering of School No. 17, were received and referred to the committee on teacher.

MEMORIAL DAY IN THE CITY

The Observance Here This Year Will be According to Custom.

MANY WILL HAVE A HOLIDAY

The Banks and Offices Will be Closed for the Day.

Many of the Manufacturing Establishments Will Also be Closed and the Public Schools Will be Closed—A Holiday Will be Assured by Other Organizations.

Memorial Day will be observed, tomorrow, in Wilmington, in the usual way. The public schools, banking institutions and most of the public offices will be closed. Some of the manufacturing establishments will give their employees a holiday, while some will take only a half holiday, being too busy to close for the whole day. In the afternoon business will be pretty generally suspended, with the exception of some of the retail stores.

The city will be in holiday attire. Many people will display flags, and from early in the morning until late in the afternoon, evidence of the observance can be seen. Early in the morning the Grand Army posts and some of the other organizations will visit the cemeteries and place flowers on the graves of the dead. du Pont Post members have been notified to meet at Grand Army Hall, Third and King streets, at 7 o'clock. They will go to du Pont's, where they will decorate the Grave of Admiral S. F. du Pont, a noted Delaware Soldier, in whose honor the post was named, and from there they will go to Greenhill, St. Joseph's and Mt. Salem cemeteries. The other posts will visit the other cemeteries, where they will perform the same duty.

All of the posts, the Sons of Veterans, Jr. O. U. A. M., Boys' Brigade of the People and other organizations will parade in the afternoon, marching out Market street to Eleventh, thence to Broome, and return to Washington, where the procession will disband.

Those who are looking for amusement will have ample opportunity to satisfy their desires. Both Shellpot and Brandywine Springs Parks will be formally opened, each with new attractions; the industrial fair at the Springs will open; additional trolley cars will be in operation and there will be an opportunity to get most anywhere.

Many games of baseball are to be played. There will be two at South Side Park, between City League teams, and two on the Union street grounds, between the Wilmington Giants and the Atlantic City team. The latter will also play championship games.

Forty-two pupils made 100 per cent, forty-one, 90 per cent, twenty-eight, 80 per cent, and twenty-seven, 70 per cent, making one hundred and thirty-eight pupils out of one hundred and eighty-nine who made a passing mark, or 75 per cent of the entire class.
