"When I came here this evening," he said, "I was reminded by my friend from the press that two years ago to-day I had sailed from New York harbon day I had sailed from New York harbor for France. It was April 13, and our convoy numbered 13. The first en-couraging news after boarding ship was from the lieutenant-commander of the British Navy, who told us there was not a ghost of a chance of getting to the other side. When asked why he had made such a statement the comhad made such a statement the com-mander replied, 'there are 13 ships in the convoy, we left the harbor on the 13th, and to make matters even worse, there are 13 Methodist parsons in this damn bunch of Y. M. C. A. secretaries. If anyone is able to break this hoodoo,

If anyone is able to break this hoodoo, he certainly has that privilege."

"It was on a calm and beautiful night," continued the speaker, "and only a day from land. We were informed that practically, every danger had passed and that we should go to bed. I crawled into my pajamas and had follow in the contract when had fallen into the first doze when 'Bing' came the torpedo. In the excitement that followed I jumped into the trousers of my bed-fellow (who by the way was quite small) and in this confusion considerable time was lost.

"However," sald Bishop Cook, were finally hauled aboard a small life-boat and within twelve minutes after being torpedoed the huge liner had dis-appeared beneath the waters. Only those who have been through the hell ish tortures of the battles in France can realize and understand what these

soldiers here have gone through."

At this point Bishop Cook startled his audience by saying: "If it could so be arranged that no one would be injured, would like to put the United States Senate under an air raid for one-half hour. It would probably be a good thing for those who enjoyed the com-forts of home-life while these brave men lived in constant dread. "

Bishop Cook told of his various trips through the battlefields of France and of the constant marching for four days and nights practically without food. He criticized the inventions of science, pointing out the loss of men killed during battle. "It is like taking men, women and children," said Bishop Cook, "and knocking them on the head." He urged clean living, fellowship and co-operation with the great church
