New Train to Royal Blue Line.

The Royal Blue Line train service to Philadelphia and New York has been greatly improved by the addition of new trains, notably the train leaving Washington at 7 a. m., arriving Philadelphia 10:15 a. m., New York 12:45 p. m., and leaving Washington at 12:30 p. m., arriving Philadelphia 3:40 p. m., New York 6:55 p. m. Southbound a new train will leave New York at 8 a. m., Philadelphia 10:30 a. m., arrive Washington 1:40 p. m., and another will leave Philadelphia 3:30 p. m., arrive Washington 6:30 p. m. The time of most of the old train has been materially reduced.
