The session of the court, so far as criminal trials is concerned, concluded yesterday. The term was a short one, although there were forty cases disposed of. Of this number there were four acquittals and one mistrial, the remainder either being found guilty or entering pleas of guilty. The sentences passed by the court yesterday were as follows:

Will Jones, entering, without breaking, the home of York Davis, one year in the penitentiary.

James Collins, second larceny, eighteen months in the penitentiary.

Ike Cunningham, vagrancy, 60 days in the county jail.

Jno. R. Crockett, selling liquor without a license, \$250 and costs or three months in jail, and in addition 30 days.

Mollie Livingstone, assault and battery, \$5 and costs or 30 days.

Bertha Davis, petit larceny, \$10 and costs or 45 days in jail.

Thompson, president, vice-president and cashier of the American National Bank of Abilene, Tex., have been indicted by the Federal grand jury charged with violating the United States banking laws. One count charges Steffens and Lowden with taking money to use in cotton speculations.
