PROGRESS OF THE CAMPAIGN

EVENTS OF PAST WEEK HAVE STRENGTHENED DEMOCRATIC FORCES MATERIALLY.

The city campaign during the past week has been a little livelier in some respects than for the previous week, and unless all signs fail the coming week is going to be a more lively one yet.

No special change in the general outlook has been apparent, however, except that the White Democratic ticket has been growing in strength and the size of its majority is without doubt getting larger.

Senator Mallory's fine speech for regular Democracy and White supremacy at Armory Hall held Wednesday night had a telling effect, and the big meeting of the Municipal League at Hotel Escambia Friday night indicated something of the number of people who are interested in the success of Mr. Bliss, the municipal ownership advocate.

The Armory Hall meeting was composed of all who could possibly get into the hall, while hundreds had to leave because there was not room for them to crowd in.

The meeting at Hotel Escambia, being held outdoors, was even larger than the Armory Hall meeting and it has been generally estimated by those who were there as the largest meeting ever held in the city of Pensacola. As Judge Wolfe remarked, the crowd could be measured only by the "acre."

From various remarks let drop by some of the Shine people, it is possible that a sensation of some kind is contemplated during the present week, but no one seems to know just what it will be.

The White Primary Democrats are taking the campaign coolly and good naturedly in striking contrast to some of their opponents who seem to be unusually excitable and irritable.

Those who are in a position to look at the matter impartially say that all these indications of temper and bad blood are sure signs that the Anti-White League know they have lost the fight and are therefore mad about it. This, it is contended, is simply human nature working out and its meaning is infallible.

There are now only ten days left until the contest will be over, and then all hard feelings will be forgotten and all will get together for Pensacola.
