THE BULLETINS POSTED BY THE MAYOR

Mayor Bliss Says He Alone Is Responsible for Them and Will Continue Practice.

Editor Pensacola Journal:

In regard to the matter of the health bulletins discussed in this morning's Journal and also in the evening News, I wish to say that the information therein contained is misleading.

I have not at any time published bulletins for the State Board of Health, nor have I signed any bulletins that I posted as by their authority. Each bulletin that I have posted I have signed as ex-officio chairman of the City Board of Health, as I had a right to do.

Before any bulletins were posted the city was all agog with wild rumors and all kinds of reports, and it took nearly half of my time to give the excited people information through the telephone, and by word of mouth, both day and night, and when any information was given it very often was distorted out of recognition before it had traveled the distance of two blocks, and so I began the posting of an official bulletin which has a very salutary effect in allaying false rumors and reports, and which has proved very satisfactory to the public at large in a general way.

These bulletins, with two or three exceptions possibly, were posted at least two or three times a day, and the public would resort to them for official information. I had a right, by virtue of my office, to post these bulletins, and did not need to ask anybody's permission to do so. I wish to say, however, that before I posted any bulletins I endeavored to get Dr. Porter to post bulletins to satisfy the public and allay the excitement and crush the false reports. He claimed that he was too busy to do this, but said, "Mr. Mayor, if you want to post bulletins, you can have that job yourself. I have not the time to bother with it."

Before posting any bulletins I obtained my information directly from headquarters. Dr. Porter was too busy to give me the information or did not have it at hand usually, and he referred me to Dr. Anderson, who is agent for the State Board of Health, and had that matter in hand. Dr. Anderson has been very courteous in giving me the information every time that I have asked for it with possibly one exception when he was too busy for some hours to make a report.

I have believed the information as I have received it in regard to the yellow fever cases, but some of the deaths resulting from yellow fever I have belittled without getting the information from Dr. Anderson.

Some time since Dr. Porter suggested to me the advisability of only making one bulletin a day in order to keep crowds from congregating on the streets and talking about the situation. I disagreed with the doctor as to the effect such a course would have, and insisted that I was honor bound to give the people the information as I had promised to do.

I shall continue to keep the public informed on the health situation, giving them the facts as they are given to me, so long as the public demands it.

I am of the opinion that the people should know the truth, and I am willing to take all the responsibility there is in posting the bulletins that have been posted by me in the past or may be posted in the future.

I am not a doctor, Mr. Editor, nor a diagnostician, and I do not know anything about yellow fever. I do know, however, that the doctors have officially pronounced a number of cases in this city to be yellow fever, and that these people have died just as yellow fever patients are said to die, and the symptoms and indications that have been published about yellow fever have been shown in these cases.

It is not my place to stop to argue a point on which I know nothing, and on which I am not supposed to know anything.

In a case of this kind it is my duty to stand by the health authorities and this I have done and shall continue to do.

I do not expect to escape criticism. No matter what I may say or do I expect to be criticised. There are always critics, kickers, chroniclers, knockers and grumblers, and life is too short to pay any attention to them. It is very much like the old harlequin saying:

"You can if you can't,
You will if you want,
You're damned if you do,
And you're damned if you don't."

So I shall just go on and do my duty as I see proper, and when I am through the people may render their verdict on what has been done.

GAETANO GIARDINAS

DIED YESTERDAY

Gaetano Giardinis, who has been a resident of Pensacola for a number of years, died yesterday shortly after 12 o'clock after a lingering illness, leaving a wife and several children. The funeral cortege will leave the family home, No. 35 South Spring street, at 4 o'clock, and proceed to St. Michael's church and thence to St. Michael's cemetery, where the interment will be made.

The ball bearers will be C. Cassim, D. Fallow, F. Divells, L. Muneri, F. Bruno and Frank Creamer. The deceased was one of the wealthiest Italians in the city, owning considerable real estate.

All Carrying Freight Will Be Compelled to go Into Quarantine for Five Days.

State Health Officer Porter yesterday issued a bulletin regarding the departure of freighters from Pensacola for points on the upper bay and sound and on Choctawhatchee sound. These orders are to the effect that no vessel of any size or description will be allowed to leave port for the above points without first going into quarantine and remaining there for a period of five days.

Tug Boats Not Included.

This order does not include tug boats which may go out after loads of lumber and timber to mills, which are near Pensacola, and where the tug boats do not touch at wharves, or the crew is not allowed to mingle with persons at any point.

Coasting vessels coming into port do not have to go into quarantine, the order applying only to those departing from Pensacola. The new regulations are as follows:

The New Order.

"Pensacola, Fla., Sept. 19, 1905. "Quarantine Regulations Governing Freighters of every size and description playing between Pensacola and points on upper bay, and Choctawhatchee Sound.—Bulletin 15.

"1. Freight boats of every size and description playing between Pensacola and points on upper bay and sound and on Choctawhatchee sound will be required hereafter to "lay out" five days detention at the Santa Rosa quarantine station under the immediate charge and supervision of the medical officer of the U. S. Public Health and Marine Hospital Service. At the end of five days if the personnel of the crew are not sick or show evidence of yellow fever he will release the vessel or boat and give the necessary pratique certificate.

"2. Under no other conditions except those mentioned above can freighter be allowed into and leave from Pensacola for points above mentioned.

"3. Lieut. Alexander, U. S. Revenue Cutter Service, in charge of the water patrol of the harbor and bay, will see that these regulations are carried out to the letter, and that freighters leaving the city wharves go direct to the Santa Rosa quarantine station.

BIRD CUSTOMS.

The Habit of Billing and the Stock Dove's Bow in a Fight.

An Englishman, Edmond Selous, has been watching doves at play and in combat. Of the habit of "billing," in which so many birds engage when they are nesting, he says: "Where birds now merely 'bill,' they once, in my opinion, fed each other, or the male fed the female, but pleasure came to be experienced in the contact alone, and the passage of food, which was never necessary, gradually became obsolete. I think it by no means improbable that our own kissing may have originated in much the same way, and that birds when thus 'billing' experience the same sort of pleasure that we do when we kiss must be quite obvious to any one who has watched them."

Of a peculiarity of the stock dove Mr. Selous writes: "When these birds fight they constantly interrupt the flow of the combat by bowing in the most absurd way, not to one another, but generally, so to speak, for no object or purpose whatever, apparently, but only because they must do so. The fact is the bow has become a formula of courtship, and as courting and fighting are intimately connected, the one suggests the other in the mind of the bird, who bows all at once under a misconception."

Sound Waves.

The sensation of sound, as is well known, is produced by a certain to and fro or wave-like movement of the air striking upon the drum of the ear and so setting it in vibration. Each sound wave consists of two portions, in one of which the air is compressed beyond and in the other rarefied below the average pressure. If two sound waves are traveling in the same direction, but one of them starts half a wave length behind the other, the compressed half of one will fall upon the rarefied half of the other, the average air pressure will remain undisturbed, and the two sounds will combine to produce silence. If a sounding tuning fork be slowly rotated near the ear four positions will be found in which the sound will be barely audible. This is due to such interference of sound waves as has been described.

How to Cut Glass.

Glass can be cut without a diamond, and the way is very simple. Dip a piece of common string in alcohol and squeeze it reasonably dry. Then tie the string tightly around the glass on the line of cutting. Touch a match to the string and let it burn off. The heat of the burning string will weaken the glass in this particular place. While it is hot plunge the glass under water, letting the arm go under well to the elbow, so there will be no vibration when the glass is struck. With the free hand strike the glass outside the line of cutting, giving a quick, sharp stroke with any long flat instrument, such as a stick of wood or a long bladed knife, and the cut will be clean and straight as if made by a regular glass cutter.

Napoleon Before the Convention.
