OF THE MOST HORRIBLE  
CRIME ON RECORDKilling of Eleven People on the  
Schooner Olympia Described  
By Only Survivor and Brute  
Who Did It.IT FORMS THE DARKEST STORY  
OF BRUTALITY IN THE ANNALS  
OF CRIME AND DETAILS ARE  
SO HORRIBLE AS TO BE AL-  
MOST BEYOND BELIEF.

(Mobile Item.)

Although the terrible crime of Robert McField, the Honduras negro, who killed eleven people aboard the schooner Olympia, has been told in the United States, the details of his awful work and the statement of the only survivor, Miss Elsie Morgan, did not reach this country until yesterday. The statement and confession of McField was obtained by Dr. J. J. Hendon of this city and given to the item for publication. The story will be of interest to all readers and the remarkable nature of the crime and the escape of Miss Elsie Morgan will go down in history unparaleled. Miss

Morgan was seen at the wharf in Uffula, Honduras, and told her story to the physician and the master of the Norwegian steamer, John Wilson. She is a remarkably bright young woman and will soon pay a visit to the states. Statement of Miss Elsie Morgan. On June 30th at 11 p. m. the schooner Olympia left this harbor for Rustan. The passengers were Mr. Walter Rose, his wife and baby; Annie Connor, Adella Bodden (girls about 15 years old), and myself.

We were about two miles from the east end of the island, when I heard a succession of shots being fired on deck and Vanvick, the mate said, "Bob, I did not think you would shoot me," and Bob replied, "I thought you were Capt. Bush." Capt. Bush ran down the cabin to get his rifle, but the negro had secured same before we went on board; in the meantime he followed him and shot him; also my sister. Mrs. Rose. Previous to that, hearing the noise I hurriedly picked up my baby and ran across to the state room. After the negro had shot Capt. Bush and Mrs. Rose he went on deck, so I came out of the stateroom. In a few minutes he returned and seeing me crying over my sister he threatened to shoot me. He then left me and went in search of three negro sailors; only one could be found, the others, I suppose had jumped overboard. There remained one sailor, Nelson Bodden (white), who had been wounded in the early part of the shooting, was brought on deck and shot. He then sent the negro sailor in search of the others and he disappeared at the time then. Bob ordered Walter Rose to assist him in launching the dory to leave the vessel, which was immediately done. We then got into the dory; Walter Rose, Adella Bodden, myself and baby. Vanvick, the mate, who was wounded on deck asked Bob to take him that he could see his wife and children before he died. Bob promised he would, and led him to the side and shot him and threw him overboard. As I was getting into the dory Annie Connor asked me to take her with me, and Bob grabbed her by the arm and threw her overboard. Her cries were piercing, calling, "Oh, Miss Elsie please save me;" her cries continued for a few minutes and she drowned; he then brought the money on deck and placed same in the dory. We then left the vessel which was about to sink, and headed for the island which was about two miles off. When we came in abreast of the island Walter asked the negro if he was going to harm them and he no; but in a few minutes after he said: Well, Walter, I shot the other fellows, I must shoot you. On hearing the words, I closed my eyes, and there was two shots fired which killed Walter Rose and Adella Bodden. He then threw the bodies overboard.

I still lay in the head with the baby in my arms, my eyes being closed; he then took the baby from my arms and threw it overboard; the screams of the baby were terrible. He then moved in the other end of the dory where the rifle was; I kept right up against him as I thought my chance more favorable; he ordered me to go in the other end and said if I refused he would shoot me, I again refused and he then drew a second revolver from his pocket and I grabbed one end of same. We wrestled for a little while, and knowing that I, a frail woman, would be overpowered by the brute, I jumped overboard; he then fired at me twice with his pistol. I swam a distance off and he called to me, saying "a shark is after you," so I swam towards the dory preferring to be shot than eaten by a shark. When I got near enough he struck me twice with the butt of his rifle; I was dazed for a little while; when I came to myself I saw him 12 to 15 yards off looking back to see if I was dead; I pretended I was dead; he thinking I was dead paddled ashore. I swam the shore down about two and one-half or three miles from where the brute left me and landed bare-foot, hairless and partly clothed. I wandered around in the swamp five days and nights. I was bothered very much at nights by crabs crawling over me. I remained in the woods the five days without food and drank water from crab holes twice. The sixth morning I met a man and he brought me home.

ELSIE MORGAN.

Confession of Robert McField, who was hung in Uffula Saturday, S. at 12:30 p. m. 1905. On Friday, the 30th day of June,

between 7 and 8 o'clock p. m., I took a dory from Mr. Amos Howell's wharf, and went on board the schooner Olympia. When the captain and crew came on board at 11 p. m. I was asleep. I came on deck when the schooner was more or less two miles from the east end of the island, having in my hands a Winchester rifle that I had bought from Albert Warren and a small revolver I had bought on the coast. Vanvick was steering and I shot him; he fell, saying, "Oh, God, Bob; would you shoot me?" Captain White Bush rushed in the cabin, I followed him and shot him, and then shot Indiana Rose. I then went in the hold and shot Nelson. I then ordered Walter Rose to hand me his pistol and go in the hold and scuttle the vessel. I called the other men aft. William Godfrey also came. I told him to go and call Denison. He went, but stayed so long that I took a lantern to go look for them. They were both gone. Elsie and Walter told me that they had jumped overboard. Previous to that William had helped Nelson come on deck, but he moaned and I shot him dead. Then I got the dory over the side. Vanvick asked me to let him see his wife and children before he died. I said I would, but he groaned and I had to shoot him dead. There was a little girl by me that was crying and I picked her up and threw her overboard.

We then went down in the dory. Walter, Elsie and the baby Della and myself. I sat in the stern. Walter was forward and the girls were sitting flat on the bottom. Day was breaking. We were about of Pumpkin Hill. I intended to land them and go to the westward. And so when Walter asked me if I was going to harm them, I told him that I would not, but later on when we were about in ten fathoms of water and Walter was close to me aft, I shot him in the back of the head, and Della as her back was turned to me, she leaning against Elsie. I then threw the bodies overboard. Then I took the baby from Elsie's arms. It was still alive, and I threw it overboard. Before leaving the vessel I had secured all the money I could find on board and put in Vanvick's pocket. I showed Elsie that the revolver was empty, and also the rifle, but as I drew an other revolver from my pocket she jumped overboard, and I fired at her twice, wounding her while she was swimming on her back. I told her there was a shark after her and she swam back to the dory. I gave her a little blow on the head with the butt of my rifle, and she sank. I never saw her any more.

Then I landed in a little cove just below Jack Right, and walked over to the Rock. I left the Pataake on the beach, took out the bag of money and hid it. I took only the gold and started for home. This side of "Bamboo" I saw Mr. Charles Cooper coming and heard somebody chopping and whistling. So I hid myself. I got home about 7 o'clock and found Ismina Carr in my kitchen. She asked me where I was coming from all wet. I said I was coming from the Cays and had shot an alligator on the way. All the people I murdered were friendly to me, none of them were my enemies. I had heard Captain White and Vanvick speak of the money they carried with them, so I made up my mind to get hold of it.

SALE MADE BY CITY TAX COLLECTOR WHITING AT COURT HOUSE MONDAY.

In accordance with advertisement of the delinquent city tax list which appeared for four weeks in The Journal last month, Tax Collector J. C. Whiting made the sale last Monday.
