**BAYOU CHICO BRIDGE READY FOR TRAFFIC**

APPROACHES HAVE BEEN FINISHED AND THE NEW STRUCTURE READY—BRIDGE IS 18 FEET IN WIDTH AND APPROACHES 26 FEET WIDE.

The new bridge spanning Bayou Chico has been completed and is now ready for traffic. Yesterday afternoon the approaches to the bridge, upon which a force of convicts under supervision of R. B. Eddins, have been employed, were completed and Monday the steam roller will go over the soil and ballast, giving it a hard finish.

The bridge, which is of cross-tied piling, is 18 feet in width, sufficiently wide to allow the passing of two vehicles, while the approaches are 26 feet in width. On the west side the approach has been built out about 300 feet, while on the east side it extends a distance of about 100 feet.

Tuesday morning Mr. Eddins will take the convicts to Eight-mile creek, where they are to be placed at work on the road there.

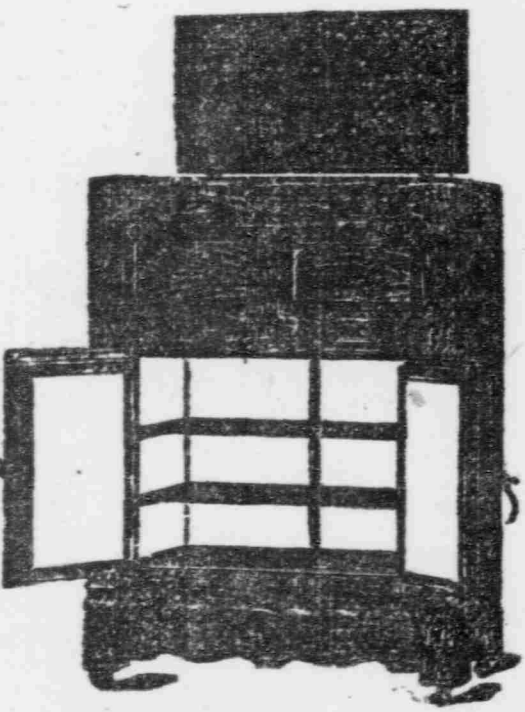
