"It's an ill wind that blows nobody any good."


What good can be got out of depression?

A period of depression is a time

for stocktaking; mental and otherwise. Merchants dig out old stock and turn it into money. That's good. They reduce their orders and buy from hand to mouth. That's good, too. Gradually stocks get depleted all over the country. Fine and dandy. Then comes a boom. Everyone wants goods at once. Bank, rattle, while go the factory wheels and we're off once more on the good road to prosperity.

Why do we have depression? There is never an upturn without a downhill. A ship can't expect to mount a wave and stay there. It must slide down the other side only to mount another.

Depressions are caused usually by over production.

Good times cause factories to launch out; to add to their machinery and to pile up stocks. Presently every factory and every store is stocked from floor to ceiling. The hands are laid off all over the country. This aggravates affairs by the immediate inability of the unemployed to purchase goods. Hence a period of depression is a period of poverty and hunger and privation for the unemployed, and this lasts generally for about a year.

The solution of this difficulty is one of the big problems of the day. The cleverest and most sincere students are unable to propose an immediately adoptable remedy. And meanwhile the unemployed suffer, the manufacturers suffer, the merchants suffer, and the army of drummers suffer.

If periods of over-production cause periods of depression, either a new method is needed of GAUGING THE PUBLIC DEMAND AND ASCERTAINING EXISTING STOCKS or a settled policy of conservatism of output.

But, under the present system of competitive production and competitive retailing, every one is grabbing all the business he can get, and nobody wants to be conservative until depression compels.

Yes, it's difficult.

The sufferers need to get together and express opinions; and out of the tangle and chaos a remedy, or a number of remedies will be found.

It is a large matter and it will take years to solve the riddle.

One obvious fact stands out clearly. Machinery is constantly being invented whereby one man can do the work of several men.

What is to become of the men so displaced?

Are they to become permanently unemployed?

That is so evidently impossible that the whole world is bound to agree upon shorter hours of labor in order to keep all men employed.

Every blessed thing is going to be done by electricity; even the washing of dishes and sweeping of floors.

You can't expect to keep everyone employed all day and every day when so many of the old fashioned jobs are accomplished by merely pressing a button.

Machinery is playing the very deuce with us; and the sooner we recognize that every new and magnificent invention should be a boon and a blessing to men the sooner we will recognize the necessity and the human reasonableness of reducing the hours of labor.

And, if the whole world agrees, it can be done. Of course it can.

This means international conference. It means work for statement of a high order. The same pacific course of international mediation for prevention of war can and eventually must and will be used for the prevention of unemployment and depression.

Depression and unemployment go hand in hand.

I don't care how large the task looks it must be dealt with or the world will witness a hell of revolution.

These are civilized times; times of thought on large topics; educated times; not ignorant, stupid times.

Man is a very different animal today compared with man of a hundred years ago. He will not consent to see machinery doing his work whilst he waddles his thumbs and whines and starves. He will either have a share in what is going on or he will rise up in wrath and there will be bloody civil war.

Yes, depression time is thinking time.

It behooves the statesmen and the capitalists and the employers of labor to sit them down calmly in conference and consider this thing wisely and well for the good of all, including their own good; for facts are stubborn things; and men like mules will kick like blazes when hungry.

Socialism and Anarchism arise out

of Depression. Extremes beget extremes. Prevention is better than CURE. Depression is here, and now is the time to consider methods of prevention for the future.

Remember the price. The price of depression is all around loss.

Remember the warning. The unemployed will sooner or later raise hell.

Today there are millions out of work. Millions of innocent, hungry and hopeless. The system will turn. Unemployed men in armies of scores of thousands have crept through the larger cities to demand work to demand food, to demand a place to sleep.

Remember the warning. There will be one Depression too many. The hell-hounds will shake loose. Desperate men adopt desperate measures. The torch will be applied to factories. The crowbar and the axe will smash the machinery. Anarchy and bloodshed; the military against the working men will spread red ruin throughout the country.
