WALTER KEHOE IS CANDIDATE FOR CONGRESS

AUTHORIZES THE STATEMENT THAT HIS "HAT IS IN THE RING" AND HE PROPOSES TO STAY.

J. Walter Kehoe of this city, is a candidate for congress from the Third district to succeed Congressman Emmett Wilson. Mr. Kehoe yesterday issued a statement, which is in part, as follows:

"Since my good friend, Emmett Wilson, has announced that he will not stand for re-election, I have definitely decided to enter the race for congress. Of course, it is entirely too early to commence an active campaign, for the primary is more than thirteen months off, but in due season, I will publish my platform and make a thorough and active campaign and ask my good friends throughout the district for their support.

"I was a candidate in 1908, when we operated under the two-primary plan, the other candidates at that time being Hon. Darnett H. Mays, of Jefferson county, Col. Jefferson D. Stephens, of Jackson county, and Hon. J. F. C. Griggs, of Franklin county. I was the high man in the first primary by about 800 votes, and in the second primary, which was between Mr. Mays and myself, the final count showed Mays, 7,676; Kehoe, 7,628—he leading by 48 votes. There were four counties in the district then; he carried seven, viz: Jackson, Calhoun, Leon, Wakulla, Jefferson and Madison. I carried seven, namely: Escambia, Santa Rosa, Walton, Holmes, Washington, Liberty and Franklin.

"Since 1908, Florida has been re-districted, and Jefferson and Madison counties have been cut off of this district. These two counties gave a net majority of 994 votes against me in 1908, so I figure that with Madison and Jefferson counties cut off, if I have retained a fair share of the friends and supporters who were with me then, and made a few new friends, which I believe I have done, I have reason to believe that I can be elected. "My practice carries me constantly into eight of the thirteen counties of the district. I am pretty well acquainted. Numerous friends throughout the district have given me their assurances of support, and having the ambition to represent this district in congress, and being encouraged by the assurances of support tendered me to use the popular expression, 'My hat is in the ring.'"

MEMBER MARINE CORPS AT NAVY YARD DROWNED

WILLIAM G. LEVENSON JUMPED OVERBOARD FOR DIVE AND FAILED TO RISE—BODY WAS RECOVERED.

William G. Levenson, aged about 25 years, a member of the 14th or Marine Gun Company, at the Pensacola navy yard, lost his life in rather a mysterious manner, yesterday forenoon, the young man drowning after having leaped for a dive from the old dock where the Prairie was tied up at, for some time during the ship's stay here. The body was recovered after a search of several hours, and it will be interred this afternoon at 4 o'clock in the national cemetery, with full naval honors.

The beneficiary is his mother, it was asserted, named in his record. She lives in New York city, and has been notified of the young man's death. Levenson, a strong swimmer ordinarily, leaped from the dock, the dive, and when he disappeared beneath the surface of the water, it was to be drawn out lifeless several hours later. Whether he struck some obstruction, or whether an apoplectic stroke, or some other helplessness seized him, was not determined. When he did not rise, however, his companions spread the information very quickly, and a search for the body was started. This continued until the body was recovered, but all efforts at resuscitation were useless. The body was searched for possible marks of violence, or for any injuries whatever, but nothing of the nature was found, so far as could be ascertained.

Deceased was accredited with a good record in the service and was serving his first enlistment. He was among those who lately came from the Philadelphia yard to duty at the local station.

VOTERS HOLD A CAMPAIGN RALLY

CROWD GATHERS IN EASTERN PART OF CITY AND HEAR ADDRESS BY W. CHIPLEY JONES.

A meeting of the Democratic voters of precinct 26, was held last night at the corner of Tenth avenue and Garden street. Between seventy-five and one hundred residents of the southeastern section of the city attended the meeting, which upon special invitation of its promoters, was addressed by W. Chipley Jones, candidate for city commissioner.

Mr. Jones discussed at length, plank by plank, each of the planks of his published platform, renewing each and every one of the pledges contained in same, stating with emphasis that he had made no other promises than are contained in same and unequivocally promising that none would be made by him to anybody.

Said he in this connection: "If I knew positively that by making a promise to give this man or that man a job in the city's employ, or to give this man or that man a contract for the city, I should be elected commissioner, I should positively and absolutely decline the proposition."

Discussing the docks and bait line plank in his platform, Mr. Jones said that in event of his election, he would insist upon the incorporation in any contract for the construction of these works a clause requiring the employment of Pensacola labor.

"In the employment of the men in the department of public works, as well as in any of the other departments of the city government," said he, "I believe in paying a living wage; but I believe in demanding of a city employee a full day's work for a day's pay, and if I am elected, I shall insist upon the adoption and pursuit of this policy in all of the city's departments."

Concluding his address, Mr. Jones said: "With reference to Mr. Johnson's candidacy, the question to be settled is: 'Has he made good on the job—has he satisfactorily performed the duties of the office which you hired him two years ago to fill?' And, as to Mr. Lillard: He has published no platform—has made the people no promises that are in any sense tangible or to which he can be held. All of his promises have been verbal, and while I do not charge that Mr. Lillard would make a promise of any nature that he did not intend to keep, verbal promises, particularly with reference to performances by a public official are always a dangerous proposition.

But," said Mr. Jones, "I understand that Mr. Lillard is really making his campaign for city commissioner more upon his record as secretary of the Escambia County Fair Association than anything else. In this connection, the thought occurs to me to ask: Does Mr. Lillard claim the credit for all of the successes which may have come to the fair association when it was in operation; does he take all of the credit, and deny the lamented T. E. Welles, and the other officers and directors of the association any share in the fair association's successes before it suspended operations as it did last year?"
