and that of Ensign McCormack to  
Somerville, Mass. The other aviator,  
Ensign Rutledge, who also lost his life  
in the same accident, will be shipped  
later.

The following is the text of the resolu-  
tion adopted, framed on motion of

the required authority for procedure:

**Official Resolution.**  
Resolved, that this board stands  
ready to grant to Herbert A. Smith, of  
Gonzalez, Florida, and his associates,  
a franchise for not less than 30 years,  
for the building and operation of an  
urban passenger and freight, electric  
or gasoline or other motor power, ex-  
cept steam, car line, alongside of the  
main county highway, from Pensacola  
to Pomaton, Alabama, the said line to  
be located on the edge of the said  
highway, in such a manner as not to  
interfere with the main purpose of  
said public road. And upon the fur-  
ther condition, that said Herbert A.  
Smith and associates secure the proper  
conveyances, or permits from the  
abutting owners of real estate along  
said highway to construct and operate  
said urban railway.




