SPECIAL SESSION OF CHANCERY COURT FRIDAY

A special session of Chancery Court will convene in Corinth on Friday next, the 18th inst., for a one-day meeting, with Chancellor A. J. McIntyre presiding.

While there are several matters of importance to be disposed of at this session, the case that will attract the attention of the court practically all day, is that of the contention of the taxpayers in 7-Mile Drainage District, regarding an extra tax assessment levied by the board of drainage commissioners at a recent meeting. The tax levy on the land in this drainage district was \$1.10 per acre, and the board levied an extra assessment of 60 cents per acre, making a total of \$1.70 per acre.

There are about twelve or fifteen tax payers who will contend for a decrease in the assessment. The drainage board consists of W. H. Powell, C. Ayers and Edgar Savage.

The board will be represented by Atty. Thos. H. Johnston, and Atty. W. C. Sweat will represent the tax payers.
