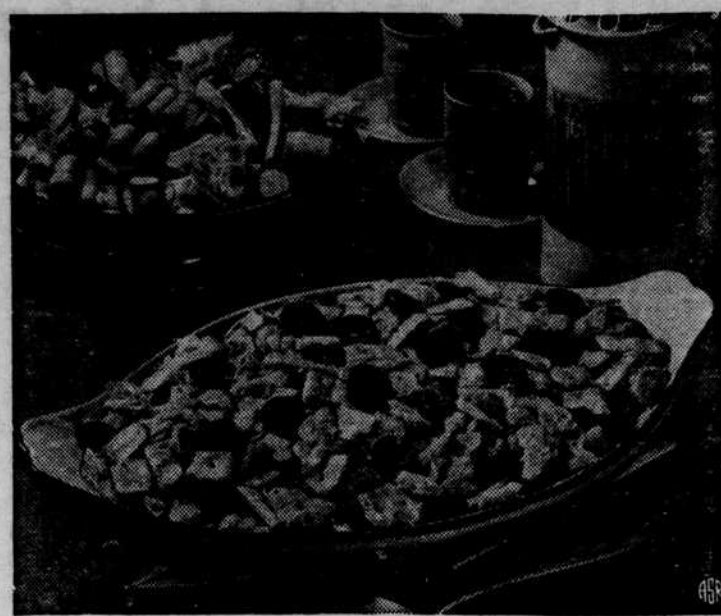

## Inexpensive, new main dish

### "Crispenny Casserole"



An inexpensive way to combat the ravenous appetites of school-age youngsters is to fill them up with "Crispenny Casserole"—a nourishing, quick-and-easy new main dish that's sure to become a winter-long favorite. Sliced frankfurters are the pennies and the crispness comes from crumbled salty saltine crackers. Chopped onions, butter, eggs, milk and pepper complete this nourishing, budget-stretching new casserole. Make it for your family this easy way:

**Crispenny Casserole**  
5 cups coarsely broken Krispy Saltine Crackers, about 25 double crackers  
2 onions, about 2 1/2 inch diameter  
4 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 pound frankfurters, sliced into 1/4 inch penny-cuts  
3 eggs, beaten  
2 cups milk  
Coarsely ground black pepper to taste

Separate crispy saltine crackers and break each into 8 or 10 pieces. Set aside. Peel and coarsely chop onions; over moderate heat, sauté onions in half the butter, until soft but not brown. Place about a third of broken crackers in a layer in bottom of shallow casserole, about two quarts capacity. Sprinkle with about half the sautéed onions and half the penny-cut frankfurters. Add about another third of the crackers, the rest of the onions and the frankfurters, saving a few penny-cuts to garnish top. Sprinkle with remaining broken crackers and cut frankfurters. Beat eggs and milk together and pour gently over casserole. Sprinkle lightly with pepper and dot with remaining butter. Bake in preheated, moderate (350°F.) oven until mixture is partially firm to touch and crackers are golden brown, about 20 to 25 minutes. Makes 6 large servings.
