

Cake Mix Makers Improving Labels

Next time you go to the grocery store, take a good look at the cake mix packages. See if you don't find some changes that make it easier to find the information on such things as ingredients and yield.

Cake mix manufacturers have agreed on several points to improve their labeling on packages.

*They will place the list of ingredients on the right side panel.

*They will place the net contents on the front panel of the package in sharp contrasting color.

*If the flavoring is artificial, they will state it on the package.

*They will tell you plainly the yield you can expect - for example, "Makes two 9-inch layers."

These changes have been made through the cooperative efforts of manufacturers.

Mulch Azaleas and Camellias
These popular shrubs need a summer mulch of 4 feet by

6 feet of pine straw, oak leaves, cottonseed hulls or peat moss. Bank mulch around plants and extend outward as far as tips of branches. It's important to water plants often enough to prevent wilting and leaf drop.
