Livingston, Guatemala, Declared a Free Port.

The Department of State has been apprised by the United States | liked That. Minister to the Central American States, Mr. Henry C. Hall, of a decree issued by the government of Geatemala, declaring Livingston, on the Atlantic coast of that republic, a free port from the 1st of January, 1883, for the importation of foreign merchandise consumption within a certain district, do scribed in article one of the decive, and for re-exportation in bonds during the period of one year. Artiele one reads as follows: In the zone for the local consumption of foreign merchandise, introduced by the port of Livingston, includes the territory situated between Sars toon and the town of Sauto Tomas, on the gulf of the same name, and the village of San Felipe, situated on the lake of Izabal, at the Straits of Yolfeto. In consequence, the following villages and hamlets are tavored : Cocoli, Sarstoon, Livingston and Santo Tomas, and others that may be formed within the territory designated. The country around Livingston is said to be rich in natural resources of soil, forests and mines. It has an important system of interior river navigation, and is believed to be among the best in Central America for tropical products. In the latter it has already a considerable trade by steamers with New Orleans.
