DEATH OF DR. W. D. BRAGG.
Dr. W. D. Bragg, who has been about eleven months a sufferer from cancer on the tongue and throat, succumbed to his life to the disease on the night of April 18, 1891, at 11:30 o'clock.

The Doctor had reached the age of 58 at the time of his death. He was for many years a practicing physician in the neighboring town of Moss Point, where he stood high in the esteem of his patients. He was a member of the Knights of Honor and the Masonic fraternity, by whom he was buried. Something over a year ago he took up his abode in Scranton, but soon after he was attacked by the fatal malady which carried him off. We can ill afford to lose him, but perhaps all things are for the best.

The funeral, which accompanied his remains to Macpherson Cemetery, was perhaps the largest that we have ever witnessed in this place. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. D. O. Byers, of the Presbyterian Church, assisted by Rev. C. A. Powell, Methodist minister. Our sympathies are tendered to the bereaved family.

DON'T FAIL TO REGISTER.

On the 20th of April Clerk W. M. Denny started out on his rounds through the county for the purpose of registering all who are entitled to register. Remember his appointments and meet him.

According to Section 4 of an ordinance of the new Constitution he will register the electors qualified under the provisions of the Constitution, which are operative prior to the election in 1891. The qualifications as stated in Section 241 of Article 12 of the Constitution for registration under said ordinance are as follows:

"Every male inhabitant, except idiots, insane and unfree Indians, who is a citizen of the United States over 21 years old; who has resided in the State 2 and in the precinct he offers to vote in 1 year; never been convicted of bribery, burglary, theft, arson, obtaining money or goods under false pretenses, perjury, forgery, embezzlement or bigamy; who has paid his taxes on or before February 1st of the year in which he offers to vote for the two preceding years. But of ministers of the Gospel if otherwise qualified only six months residence in precinct is required."

MEETING OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

Monday night, April 13th, the Board was called together at the usual hour.
Present: Mayor Geo. Mathieu; Aldermen Luce, DeJean and Morlet. Minutes of former meeting read and approved.

The petitions to sell vineyard and spirituous liquors of Volney Brown and B. J. Jane were granted.
Petition of S. R. Thompson for the same purpose was received and granted, provided no counter petition is filed within 30 days.

The petitions of M. V. B. Carey and Whitaker & Bolden for privilege to retail were received and ordered filed.
Some few bills against the town were allowed and ordered paid.

The reports of the Mayor, Marshal and ex-Marshall were received and referred to the finance committee.
Permission was granted S. R. Thompson to remove a small frame building adjoining the stable of Chas. Krebs along the street to his own lot, provided the work is completed within one week from the time of commencing operations.

There being no further business the Board adjourned until next regular meeting night.

THE MOSS POINT ARSON CASE.

Last Friday Gordon Childress, J. W. Frost and Thos. Grant were brought before Chancellor S. Evans on a writ of habeas corpus, to be tried for the burning of a store in Moss Point. This case has caused a great deal of excitement and comment in this section. The parties above named had a preliminary hearing at Moss Point before Justice Thompson the same day of the fire, and was by him committed to jail in default of \$1,000 bonds. Therefore it became necessary to sue out a writ of habeas corpus. We did not expect from the heavy bail required, and the amount of talk about the case, that the prosecution would make a pretty fair showing to show up the guilt of the parties, but in that they were mistaken, for a weaker prosecution was seldom ever made. There was not evidence enough in the case to hold the accused much less a conviction. They were promptly released.

IDENTIFIED AT LAST.

The man who was picked up dead in a boat here some time ago, and supposed to be Daniel Green, turns out to be Dominick C. Martin, a Frenchman from Shell Beach, near New Orleans. His widow and his son, Louis Martin, came over Tuesday to look into the manner of his death and to take possession of his effects. This, however, they were unable to do at present, as it will be necessary for them first to administer on his estate in Louisiana and produce a certified copy to that effect before taking possession.

Martin was 75 years old, and was a professional trapper. For thirty years he was a hunter for the New Orleans market, but his sight becoming dim he laid down his gun for his traps. He has five children, all of whom are grown. His children had long tried to get him to stop trapping and remain at home, which he would occasionally promise to do, but the ruling passion was too strong, and he would load his boat and set sail.
