TOWN OF SCRANTON.

The regular meeting of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen was held at the Mayor's office, on Tuesday, Feb. 8, 1894.

Present: M. C. Allman, Mayor; R. E. Roquerbe, and S. R. Thompson, Aldermen; R. E. Brown, Marshal. Messrs. J. W. Allman and W. M. Canty, Aldermen, were absent.

Report of Treasurer shows cash balance of \$607.08.

The Marshal's report read and accepted.

Petition of Charles J. Jacobson to retail liquor was ordered filed.

After making the usual allowances the Board adjourned to 12th inst., on which day the Board was called to order. The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved. The election of a town attorney postponed.

Ordered, That an election be held on Monday, the 20th of March, 1894, at the Mayor's office, within legal hours, and that J. L. Ford, J. D. Clark and C. Nelson are hereby appointed election judges.

Ordered, That the proper ballots for said election, and there shall be printed on same the words, "For Water," or "Against Water." The town of Scranton maintaining and operating and selling the water from the town artesian well and regulating same.

Ordered, That a bridge be placed at the intersection of Magnolia and Ker streets.

Ordered, That a bridge be built across the line on Live Oak street 20 feet wide with guard rails.

The bid of the Pascagoula Democrat-Star for the public printing of the town, including the minutes and proceedings and legal advertisements for one year from the 7th of February for the sum of \$103, payable quarterly, was accepted.

Ordered, That 2000 feet of four and half-inch iron piping be purchased for water mains and 2000 feet of 2 inch iron pipe and all fittings necessary, together with 6 fire plugs to be installed in the water mains for fire purposes with all necessary equipments purchased from the lowest bidder.

Ordered, That the sale of property belonging for municipal taxes for the year 1893 be made in front of the court house by the town tax collector according to law.

The usual allowances and bills were ordered paid.

Judge Childsey overruled the motion, saying that the contract conformed to section 329 of the code of 1880. The case is appealed to the circuit court.
