IN MEMORIAM.
Dr. H. L. Howe was born May 20, 1824, at Winchester, Wayne county, Miss. This sketch is written by one who knew and loved him for forty years.
He graduated with highest honors early in life in medicine, and began the practice of medicine at Enterprise, Clark county, Miss. He went to California during the gold excitement in 1849, and was wrecked in the Straits of Magellan during his passage.
He married at Enterprise, Miss. Miss Winifred Ward of Memphis, Tenn., soon after his return, and two sons and one daughter were the issue of this happy marriage. One son, Geo. L. Howe, and an adopted daughter, Miss Maggie Ingraham Howe, survive him.
He was a brigade surgeon in the Confederate army, and was a patriotic and loyal disciple of the "Lost Cause." He removed to Jackson county, Miss., in 1868, where he continued to reside till the time of his death at Moss Point, Miss., May 1, 1901.
He was a skillful and prominent physician, and did a fine practice till total blindness compelled him to give it up.
The public schools of this county were very poor, and there were only a half dozen or more in the county, and these were operated every two years, and the people of the county asked Dr. Howe to serve them as County Superintendent of education. He was appointed to the position about 1876, and continued to serve in that capacity for twenty years, and truly his administration was a model one. He created a school fund, and office stands a living monument to his memory as a prominent educator and a splendid financier. He created a school fund, and increased the number of schools to fifty-seven, and drew around him a corps of the ablest and best-informed as well as best paid teachers in the state. His noble health compelled him to retire from public work five years ago to the regret of the whole county, and he left all his duties and all his schools in prosperous condition and over \$2,000 in the school treasury.
Dr. Howe joined the Magnolia fraternity in 1852, and was in continuous membership ever since. He assisted in organizing Pascagoula Lodge, A. F. and A. M., and was elected its highest officer, W. M., and held creditably for eight years. He was High Priest of H. L. Howe Chapter Royal Arch Masons, and was made honorary life member of the Grand Lodge in 1888 at Royal Valley. The honor was conferred for long and meritorious services in freemasonry.
The funeral services were conducted by Past Master G. W. O'Neil at the Griffin cemetery at Moss Point. His pall bearers were: Messrs. A. Blumer, C. H. Alley, R. W. Cowan, W. E. Coulson, J. B. Taylor and G. W. O'Neil.
He was one of the most useful citizens that our county has ever boasted of, and his large circle of friends deeply lament his loss and tender sincere sympathy to his devoted and bereaved family. For many years he dwelt in total darkness, but in his ever patient, and for many years an elder in the Presbyterian church. He lived such a pious, patient, christian life that he furnished a beautiful example of piety to all.
Then went not for him kind, loved ones.
"He is not lost, but gone before," and his poor darkened eyes are shining resplendent with love of Jesus, and he wears a crown of jewels with the jewels mined from a long life spent in good works, around the pure white throne where sickness and sorrow, pain and death, can enter nevermore, and the kind scarred hands of Jesus.
Have rolled all the nights away.
And on his darkness vision,
Shines the sun of immortal Day.
