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The defeat of the bond issue for Agricultural High School purposes is no surprise to those familiar with conditions in the rural section of the country. Like all new innovations the people must be educated up to the necessity of such a school. The defeat is not a defeat it is a postponement. It is bound to come sooner or later. We know the advantages of such an institution are bound to become patent to a majority of the people of this county. Unfortunately, as seems to be the case in too many instances prejudice between country and town entered into the question. We even heard it said it was gotten up and pushed for the interest of this town. This is unreasonable. This town has one of the very best high schools in the state. It would not increase the value of our educational facilities but little if any over what we have, on the other hand the fourth of the small tax to sustain it would have been paid by the taxpayers of this town.

We regret the loss of the school for the benefit the rural country would have derived from it. It was a step forward along educational lines regardless of its location but we did not take it. We have taken a step backward.

The board of trustees of the Holmes County Agricultural High School at a meeting held in Lexington Tuesday awarded the contract to W. G. Googin, of Durant, for building another dormitory and another school building for the Agricultural High School at Goodman. This institution has proven a splendid investment on the part of the county and has fulfilled its mission to such a satisfactory degree that a bond issue for needed enlargements and improvements met with but little opposition.—Lexington Advertiser.

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Call for Election.

The Democratic Executive Committee of Neshoba County met Tuesday April 25th pursuant to the call of the chairman and proceeded to business as follows:

It appearing that a call by Chairman Dem. State Ex. Com. been issued for a State Democratic Convention for May 18, 1916 and in his call he suggested that County Conventions be held for the purpose of electing delegates to State convention on May 15th 1916. It was therefore ordered that a county Democratic convention be and is hereby called for May 15th 1916 at 10 A. M. at the court house in the town of Philadelphia Miss. and it is further ordered that precinct elections be held for the purpose of electing delegates to County Convention on May 8th at the different precincts.

The law provides that the voters shall meet at the precincts on this date May 8th at 10 a m and by secret ballot elect as many delegates as shall be apportioned that precinct by the Co. Committee. And the list of delegates so selected should be immediately forward to J. H. Hester Sec. The different precincts are entitled to representation in the County Convention as follows:

Phila 14, W Phila 6, Hickory Springs 2, Holy Cross 2, Tucker 2, Kentarky 3, Sierra 3, North Bend 2, Coy 2, Forest Dale 2, Center 2, Cherry Level 4, Muckalusha 2, Dowdville 2, House 2, Golden Grove 3, Crenshaw 6, Hays 4, Dixon 3, Woodland 6, McDonald 4, Bethany 2, Darby 2, Groves 2, Fussy 4 Burnside 3, Stallo 2.

This representation is based on vote at last Presidential election and it is the desire of the committee that the citizens turn out on May 8th and have each precinct fully represented at Philadelphia on May 15th as in addition to selecting delegates to Jackson a new county Executive Committee must be chosen.
