## Contract for Bored Well Let.

A meeting of subscribers to the fund to pay for the sinking of an artesian well within Scooba's corporate limits, was held at the Bank Monday evening, the greater number of the contributors being either present or represented.

Several propositions to bore the well were submitted, one from Mr. John H. Pinson, of Geiger, Ala., being accepted and the committee in charge of arrangements, Messrs. Stuart, Kuykendall, Twilley, Eastland and Watts, was instructed to contract with Mr. Pinson for the work. Mr. Pinson's proposition is, to bore 1,000 feet for \$550.00, and to go 200 feet deeper, if necessary, at the rate of \$1.50 per foot; the subscribers to the movement to furnish piping and other necessities.

As to the location of the well, all contributors of sums over \$25.00 favored the Union Church lot, about the center of town, or further west, and the sentiment of those present being almost unanimous, the church lot location was adopted.

Something over \$1,000.00 has already been subscribed to the fund for the boring of this well, and the greater part of this amount has already been paid in. Further contributions are solicited, as the mere boring of the well will not end the work by any means. It is hoped to place a large tank above the well, to erect a neat shelter over it, and to lay a good-sized pipe from the well to the railroad frontage, where a watering-trough for stock can be placed.

There are many from out of town who will be benefited by this innovation; they are invited to subscribe something. Mr. Puckette, the contractor, has offered to donate \$50.00 worth of cement work.

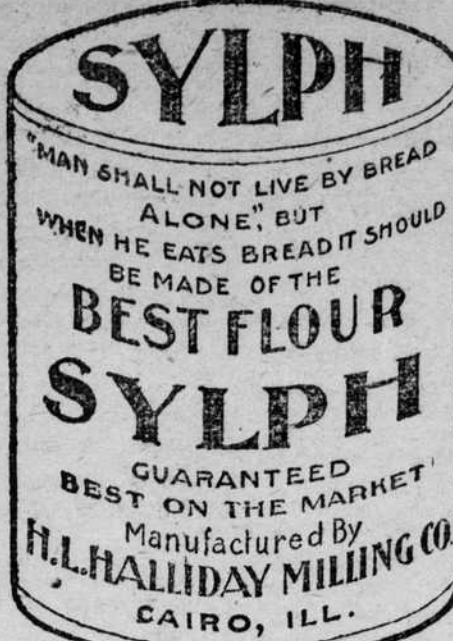

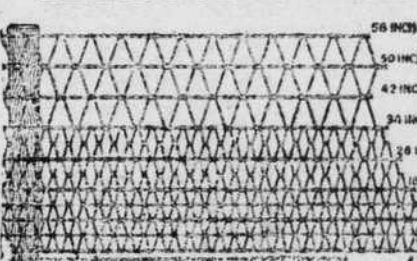
