#### For the Uncle Remus Memorial.

An event of the week which should appeal to the interest and challenge the public spirit of thousands of men, women and children in Atlanta, is the performance of the musical extravaganza, "Jappy" for the benefit of the Uncle Remus Memorial.

Three performances are to be given, Thursday and Friday evenings and Saturday matinee. Plans are already on foot to make a branch public library of part of the home place, while other portions of the building, notably the work-rooms of Uncle Remus, are to be maintained as they were in his life-time that pilgrims from the country over may pay homage to his memory. It is also expected that a play ground for children will occupy part of the spacious premises surrounding the house.
