



The New Council Assembles and Organ

The old Council assembled Tuesday night for the last time, the following members answering the roll call: Brenan, Hathaway, McClure, Moore, Peters, Rech and Weber, President pro tem Hathaway in the chair.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The report of the Mayor for the period from April 1st to April 14th, was submitted, read and approved. The report showed a total collected of \$81 and paid to city \$55.15.

Building permits were granted to Frank Weber, on Second street and F. S. Shurick, on Fourth

The usual number of bills were presented and allowed and Council adjourned sine die, the old body passing out of existence.

Kyle was arrested for breaking into the church and was
