### ORDERED OUT.

The Street Railway Employes at Philadelphia Strike.

A Majority of the Six Thousand Employes Obeyed the Order.

All the Lines in the Quaker City Will Be Tied Up—The Police Are Making Every Preparation to Guard the Traction Company's Enormous Property.

PHILADELPHIA, April 30,—A strike has been again ordered upon the lines of the Union Traction Co. by the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Employes, to go into effect at four o'clock Thursday morning. After the refusal of the president to submit the questions to arbitration the central committee of the association held a meeting Wednesday evening. The re-sult of the deliberations was the ordering of the strike. The committee considered that the refusal of Mr. Walsh to arbitrate settled any show by peaceable methods any adjustments of the grievances of the men and they now propose to fight for what was refused them. The committee claims that a majority of the six thousand men on the company's system will obey the order to quit, and that all the lines will be tied up. With a lively recollection of disorders attending the strike last December, the police are making every preparation to guard the company's

property and to prevent violence.


