## ORDERED OUT.

The Street Railway Employees at Philadelphia Strike.

A Majority of the Six Thousand Employees Obeyed the Order.

All the Lines in the Quaker City Will Be Tied Up. The Police Are Making Every Preparation to Guard the Traction Company's Enormous Property.

PHILADELPHIA, April 30.—A strike has been again ordered upon the lines of the Union Traction Co. by the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Employees, to go into effect at four o'clock Thursday morning. After the refusal of the president to submit the questions to arbitration the central committee of the association held a meeting Wednesday evening. The result of the deliberations was the ordering of the strike. The committee considered that the refusal of Mr. Walsh to arbitrate settled any show by peaceable methods any adjustments of the grievances of the men and they now propose to fight for what was refused them. The committee claims that a majority of the six thousand men on the company's system will obey the order to quit, and that all the lines will be tied up. With a lively recollection of disorders attending the strike last December, the police are making every preparation to guard the company's property and to prevent violence.

No disorder was reported Tuesday morning, and cars are running regularly on all the lines. There is no outward appearance that a strike is in progress.

### SOCIETY EVENT.

CHICAGO, April 30.—Miss Florence Pullman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George M. Pullman, was married Wednesday night to Frank Orren Lowden, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. O. Lowden, of Hubbard, Ia., at the Prairie avenue mansion of the bride's parents. The function was the most brilliant society event of the year.

Two hundred relatives and friends witnessed the ceremony, which was performed in the main drawing room by Rev. James Pullman, of Lynn, Mass., assisted by Rev. Royal S. Pullman, of Baltimore, both uncles of the bride. The bridal party passed through an improvised aisle of white and gold enameled posts wound in myrtle surrounded by wreaths of lilies of the valley and magnolia, and tied with white satin ribbons from post to post, extending the length of the building. The whole house was profusely decorated with orchids, roses and palms. A musical programme was rendered before and after the ceremony in the music room, where a superb

**Congressman Patterson Indorsed.**  
MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 30.—Congressman Josiah Patterson received a strong indorsement from the democratic convention of this, his home county, Wednesday. President Cleveland and Secretary Carlisle were also indorsed. It was not a congressional convention. The gold standard majority was obtained in this city, the interior districts being almost solidly for silver.

**Another Carnegie Library Building.**  
PITTSBURGH, April 30.—Andrew Carnegie has purchased for \$25,000 a plot of ground at Duquesne, on which he will erect two handsome buildings, one for a public library, the other for a gymnasium and natorium. The estimated cost of the buildings is \$150,000.

**Knapp on His Way to Constantinople.**  
CONSTANTINOPLE, April 30.—Rev. George Knapp, the American missionary, who was recently expelled from Bitlis and whom the Turkish authorities endeavored to deport from Iskanderoun, has started from the latter place on his way to this city.

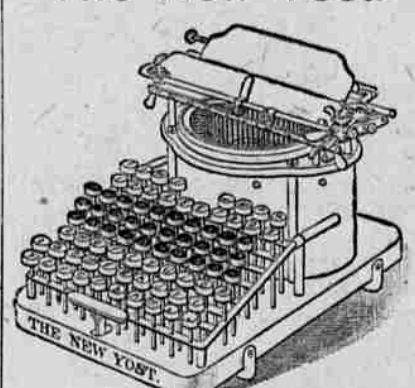
