

The Heat in Europe.

By Associated Press. London, July 13.—Violent thunderstorms and tropical rains in various parts of Great Britain last night moderated the ferocious heat. There were 12 deaths from heat in the French capital. Advices from other points on the continent indicate that the weather conditions are again normal.

Head Almost Torn off.

By Associated Press. Chicago, Ill., July 13.—Although his head is nearly torn from his body, Joseph Burdick is still alive and furnishing the most remarkable case known to physicians. His head hangs by a mere shred, being almost severed by a huge piece of metal which fell across his neck. His neck was not broken nor were the jugular veins and carotid artery injured. He is equipped with a device for breathing which projects from the throat just above the collar bone.

General Funston's Report

Capture of Aguinaldo.

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., July 13.—The War Department today made public Brigadier General Funston's report of the capture of Aguinaldo, made under date of May 6th. This report presents in detail all the facts relating to the capture of Aguinaldo which were made public at that time.

General Funston shows that his entire plan of expedition was submitted to the Commanding General of the department of Northern Luzon and then was sent to General MacArthur, by whom it was approved.

General Funston goes into details concerning the capture and correspondence from Aguinaldo and the use he made of Cecilio Sagismundo, who had presented himself to Lieut. J. D. Taylor of the Twenty-fourth Infantry with letters of Aguinaldo that he was to deliver to various insurgent chiefs. General Funston gives an account of the forged letters which were used to deceive Aguinaldo and writes as follows of the actual capture of the insurgent leader:

"The Maccabees started up into the town and we heard a few shots, followed by scattered firing. We hastily crossed the river and running up on the town found that the Maccabees were somewhat demoralized and firing wildly. They were gotten under control with some difficulty. Aguinaldo's guard of about fifty armed men had been drawn up to receive the reinforcements and on being fired into broke and

ran, a few of them returning the fire as they retreated. Aguinaldo, with his officers, had awaited in his quarters. Placido and Segovia entered the house to report their arrival and after a short conversation Segovia stepped outside the house and ordered the Maccabees who had just come up the river bank to open fire on the insurgents who were standing in line fifty yards away. The Maccabees were so excited that their fire was ineffective. But two of the insurgents were killed, the remainder in their flight threw away eighteen rifles and a thousand rounds of ammunition. As soon as Segovia had given the order he ran back into the house and opened fire on the officers surrounding Aguinaldo wounded Villa and Alhambra, the latter jumped out of the house into the river and was not seen again. Villa, on being wounded, surrendered, as did also Santiago Barcelona, Aguinaldo's treasurer.

The remaining officers escaped from the house and swam the river. Placido seized Aguinaldo and told him that he was a prisoner of the Americans. At this juncture the Americans arrived on the scene and gave their attention to getting the Maccabees under control and protecting the prisoners for them. One Maccabee was slightly injured on the forehead.

In conclusion Funston deals out praise generously to all who had a share in the expedition. He also speaks in high praise of Commander Barry, of Vicksburg, and the assistance the Navy rendered him.

GIRL

Now Denies the Story of the Assault.

Muncie, Ind., July 13.—George Davis, aged 18, testifying in court today, swore that Ralph Coke and others, accused by her, were innocent and that she had not been assaulted. She said she preferred to go to prison for perjury rather than to send to prison the young men. The case against Coke was dismissed. The girl was sent to prison for ten years.

Her parents live in West Virginia. Some believe she was intimidated and forced to retract her first story of the assault. An investigation is in progress.
