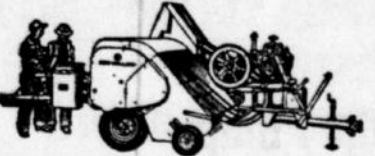

## Census Questionnaires Will Be Mailed Soon To Farmers Of Area

Agriculture census questionnaires will be received by farmers through the mail this week, shortly before official taking of the census is started early in April, census officials announced last week.

Distribution to farmers is being made early to give the rural residents an opportunity to complete the questionnaires before the census registrar calls at the home.

The census of agriculture is a questionnaire about farms and pro-

duction. The census bureau said no difficult questions are involved and that most can be answered simply by "yes" or "no".

Statistics gathered from this census will be the basis of studying farm problems, and are also used in the annual crop and livestock estimates.

Congress uses census statistics in legislation when considering farm legislation and the department of agriculture also makes extensive use of the data.

## Edgar Chamberlain Chairman Of Cleanup-Paintup-Fixup Campaign

Edgar Chamberlain has been named chairman of Bluffton's Cleanup-Paintup-Fixup campaign set for May 18 through 27, and plans for the city-wide program are taking shape.

Sponsored by the Business Men's association and the municipal government, the cleanup drive is seen as a community venture which will make the town a cleaner, healthier and more pleasant place in which to live.

Special posters publicizing the campaign will be on display in the business district, and the cooperation of individuals and organizations will be asked in making the program a success.

An innovation in this year's campaign will be a request for each resident and businessman to clean up the walks and streets in front of his property, piling leaves, sticks and other items in the gutter. Town trucks then will pick up the rubbish and take it away.

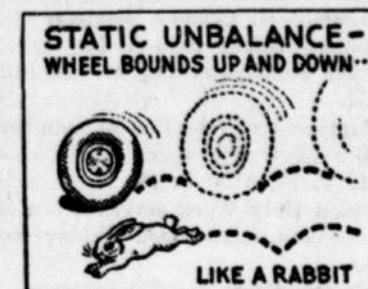
