

Rain Washes Out Opening Games On High School, College Baseball Cards

Continued rainfall has washed out opening baseball games of the season for both Bluffton High and Bluffton college nines, but high school officials are hopeful they can get their season under way this Friday with the college looking forward to an intra-squad game on Saturday afternoon.

Bluffton High's scheduled opener with Lima Central at Lima set for Tuesday was postponed because of wet weather, and the Pirates will have their next chance to see action in a contest with Lima St. John's on the Harmon field diamond, Friday afternoon.
