## THE CONVENTION.

Wood County Republicans meet in Convention and Nominate Officers Who Will be Elected.

Delegates Selected to Congressional and Judicial Conventions.

It was boiling hot in Bowling Green on Tuesday. That yellow sand drew the heat right out of Old Sol and the delegates and others attending the annual convention were forced to pull off their coats and mop their faces, and swear because the convention was not held in the grove where an occasional fresh breath might be had.

It was a grand gathering however; in fact everybody gathered—some roses and some thorns—but it was mostly thorns for the Perrysburg delegation. At about 10:30 a. m. Chairman Nearing called the convention to order and introduced Hon. E. W. Poe, who had been selected to preside over the convention as temporary chairman.

In assuming charge of the meeting chairman Poe made a few remarks thanking the convention for the honor and congratulating the Republicans on the glorious achievements of the party.

The Republican editors were made the Secretaries, and on motion each voting precinct selected one member to serve on each of the following committees: Credentials, Permanent Organization, Resolutions, Rules and Order of Business and Central Committee.

On motion the following committee was selected by the chair to apportion the Congressional and Judicial delegates to the different townships:—C. S. Van Tassel, E. Fuller, G. C. Nearing, F. H. Thompson, A. L. Huddle, W. S. Richards, F. M. Young, L. C. Edgar, and R. Shoemaker.

After the reports of committee men, the committees were assigned their places for deliberation, and convention adjourned for dinner.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Temporary Chairman Poe called the convention to order and the glee club favored the audience with a campaign song which was loudly applauded.

The Committee on Credentials then reported all delegations legally and properly elected and that the townships were represented by their proper number of delegates.

Committee on Permanent Organization reported and recommended Dr. W. T. Thomas of North Baltimore as Permanent Chairman and the temporary Secretaries were made permanent.

Chairman Thomas was called to the chair and was introduced and after a few remarks proceeded with the regular business, by calling for reports of the Committees.

### RESOLUTIONS.

Upon the call for the report of the resolutions committee, D. K. Hollenbeck read the following:

The Republicans of Wood County, Ohio, in convention assembled hereby resolve.

1. That we heartily endorse the administration of President Harrison, and most heartily desire a continuation thereof.

2. That we most heartily and earnestly endorse the administration of Gov. Wm. McKinley jr. and his past services in Congress.

3. That we further and fully endorse the policy of reciprocity advanced and established through the matchless diplomacy of our late Secretary of State, James G. Blaine.

4. That we will unanimously endorse at the polls the ticket which may be nominated here to-day, and that we will as heretofore, use all honorable means for its election entire.

5. That we heartily endorse the candidacy for Congress of our esteemed fellow citizen, Dr. J. C. Lincoln, and recommend that the delegates from Wood county to the congressional convention use all honorable means to secure his nomination.
