MANCHESTER, N. H., Aug. 26.—George S. Abbott, altas Frank S. Almy, the murderer of Christia Warden, is now in jail here. While on his way to this city a number of people boarded the train and tried to get a glimpse of the prisoner as he lay in his cot in the special car. In the car besides the murderer were Charles Warden and America and averaged Sheriff Brighorn and deputies and several

newspaper men.

At Canaan, Hon. George W. Murray, who defended Abbott at his trial for the burglaries in Vermont, passed through the car and immediately recognized the prisoner as his termer client.

On the arrival of the train at Concord the crowd was so great that Abbott's car had to be run into the yard to await the making up of the train for Manchester. Warden Phillsbury, of the State prison, came into the car here, and taking the prisoner by the band said: "How do you do, Abbott?" The prisoner replied: "I do not know you." He appeared to be ufraid of the crowd, and draw a sheet over his face to prevent recognition.
Officer Foster, who lives near the Warden farm, on leaving Abbott, grasped his hand, when the latter said "good-hye" and burst into tears.

DIGGING FOR BODIES

The Ghastly Work in New York Still Continues.

OVER 60 VICTIMS THUS PAR

A Large Feros of Men at Work on the Rains To-day.

How Many More Bodies Lie Burled Time Will Tell-Many of Those Recovered Are Torn Asunder-Preparing the Unidentified at the Morgos for Burlah More Heartrending Scenes.

New York, Aug. 26 .- The Park place ruins are yielding up their dead. Stub-bornly they cling to the bodies, making the rescuers fight for every inch of van-This is the fourth day since the collapse of the building, and no one yet knows how many are buried there.

In a hundred homes are wailings of women mourning for their lost ones. Many have not even the melancholy comfort of having their dead with them. So all day long they haunt the morgus or the scene of the disaster.

Up to I o'clock the braised and burned Up to 1 o'clock the braised and burned bodies of sixty victims of the Park place fire had been taken from the ruins. How many more blackened corpses are still under the mass of bricks, braken timber and twisted from layer only a mat-ter of conjecture, but there will probably be forty more uncarthed before the debris has been observed away. has been cleared away.

Crowds Surround the Buins,

The crowds of people with morbid curi-The crowds of people with motors car-osity continue in the strents adjacent to the scene of the disaster. They fight and push and maul each other for places near the police line, where they may see at least the boxes that contain the mangled and burned bodies of the victims as they are lifted out. They can see nothing else, yet they stand and fight for hours. The roots, the five excapes, the windows of the adjoining buildings are all crowded, and in these crowds are women, dozens, hun-dreds of women, all anxious to see a burned human being.

Many Chartly Scenes.

From midnight until daylight the the beltef that the greater number of the victims will be found under the center of the debris where the full weight of the building fell.

From hour to hour the scenes around From sour to main the season are the reins differ but little. It is the same ceaseless round of digging at the wreck, broken by the occasional inding of another bedy. If there is any change at all it is that the fact is brought more and more strongly to the mind of the great extent of the tragedy. Every now and then during the day the Italians uncarthed parts of human beings all in a very de-composed state, legs, arms, feet, and in one or two instances heads were found and placed carefully away with any parts of clothing that may have been found near them for the purpose of identification if

At 7:15 a fearfully mangled body was

At 7:10 a fearfully mangled body was recovered from the east side of the ruins. One-half of the head was completely crushed, and nothing was found which might lead to identification. At 8:50 another bruised form was found. As the coroner stepped up to view it as it was being raised by the firemen, the head dropped off and disappeared in the black denths below. The body was that of a depths below. The body was that of a young girl about 17 years old. At this time three mangled forms were in sight. These three, and also snother one, were taken out by 10 o'clock. The last four bodies recovered were those of men.

The Dead Wagon in Demand.

The peak wages is beaming.

The police on duty have made of a muddy plank from the week a sort of counter, upon which the papers and valuables taken from each body as it is dug out are ranged for official registration and examination by the friends present. Alongside of the officer who does this stands the cuffic containing the charred corpse that is being searched. It is usustands the coffin containing the charred corpse that is being searched. It is usually the top of a pile three or four high. Periodically the dead wagon comes for its load, and the pile is removed or dwindles down to one. But ers long it has grown again to its former height. The dead wagon has many a weary journey ahead before it shall have made its last trip down Park Piace. To be Taken from the Morgae and Buried

To-day. New York, Aug. 20.-The scenes at the morgue to-day were, if it were possible, more pathetic and touching than on any other day since the dreadful

calamity. The "body" room is lined with pine the body room is inset with place boxes each containing its grim corpse, some of which are becoming so far advanced in decomposition that the odors within the building are mest offensive. Some women looking for the remains of missing husband, son or brother, fainted, and had to be carried out of the build-

The clothing, what remains of it, and anything clas that might possibly lead to identification, will be preserved and separately marked with the number of the box in which the body was, and the bodies will each be buried separately in marked graves, so that they can be identified and readily exhunced in onse they are claimed by the friends or relatives.
