

I beg to say that it seems apparent that there is no balance left for which the cost of the permanent improvements now being made in parts by the prough can be

met.

"The total bonded debt is now over \$100,000.
The valuation of the borough for 1809 is \$2,428,457 on which oven with the consent of the people, only ? per cent of this amount can be legally made, or \$100,901.99.

"In addition to the above funded debt you have a temporary loan existing of some \$0.500, and probably the Mrs. Haley Judgment of \$2,000. You therefore are nearly your constitutional limit and, even by issuing bonds, this work would exceed your rights.
