

Prison Act Is Invalid.

In a lengthy opinion handed down on Monday morning, Judges Woodward and Lynch decide that the recent act of assembly which says the court shall appoint one Democrat and one Republican as prison commissioners, is unconstitutional and void. By the opinion, the judges ignored the act, and, by an order flied, reappointed B. Burgunder and T. M. Conniff as prison commissioners for the ensuing year.

This appointment will virtually keep the position of warden and assistants in in the hands of the Democrats, unless the decision is reversed by the higher courts. The three county commissioners and two men appointed constitute the board of prison commissioners, and, as the appointees and one county commissioner are Democrats, they will have a majority of one on the board. It is not likely that any change will be made in the management of the prison until the supreme court decides the legality of the prison board to make contracts with the warden for the feeding of prisoners.
