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LATEST BY TELEGRAPH. FATHER QUINN'S WORK. NEW YORK, March 28.—Large meetings were held this afternoon and evening looking to the establishment of an American Independent church, at which addresses were made by Rev. Fathers Quinn, Wood, Broderick and others, formerly Roman Catholic priests. It was stated that many priests were at present engaged in the work and Father Quinn, president of the organization, was daily in receipt of communications from priests who were preparing to abandon Romanism, and who were very anxious to labor for the best poor people in the extension of the true principles and practices of Christianity. Letters were read from several priests, saying their whole heart was in the movement, and communications were presented from Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian conferences in Baltimore, Philadelphia and New Jersey heartily endorsing the movement.

WASHINGTON, March 28.—Mr. Warner of Ohio, of the house coinage committee, has recently had a conference with the secretary of the treasury and the postmaster-general in relation to the question of carrying packages of silver through the mails with a view to getting it into general circulation. It is found in practice that under the law passed at the extra session fractional silver coins have a tendency to accumulate at the various money centers, and then instead of going back through the business channels to the people of the country, they find their way directly into the treasury, where they are constantly accumulating. All this time there is a scarcity of these silver coins everywhere else. Mr. Warner wants the secretary of the treasury to have the authorization of law to return this fractional silver to the country banks through the mails in registered envelopes in sums of ten dollars and upwards, not to exceed four pounds in weight, as that is the limit under the postal laws; the applicant for such coins to pay the registration fee and be at all risk, the packages to go free of postage. The secretary of the treasury thinks this can be done now without any change in the law and the postmaster-general concurs in that opinion.

WASHINGTON, March 28.—An attempt will be made this week in the house to take up the interstate commerce bill for consideration, but it is altogether probable that for a month or more appropriation bills will be given undisputed right of way. Debate on the deficiency bill will begin in the senate on Tuesday or Wednesday and continue through the remaining days of the week, if not longer. There is no doubt, whatever, that the discussion on the Garfield amendment to the election law will be bitter and exciting. It will take a wide political range and embrace many party questions bearing upon the coming presidential campaign.

WASHINGTON, March 28.—The Democratic city convention for the purpose of nominating candidates for the ensuing city election, was held last night and resulted in the choice of the following ticket: For mayor, M. J. Rountree; marshal, Geo. D. Elery; treasurer, R. L. Goode; clerk, W. G. Porter; attorney, John C. Keet; assessor, Wm. Hargraves. The nominees for members of the council are Marshal Echelbert in the First ward; James Hodnett in the Third ward, and L. Y. Watson in the Fourth ward. The ticket is considered an excellent one from mayor to assessor, and is sure to win. Great enthusiasm prevails among the Democrats, and a united and unusual effort will be made to redeem the city in the coming election.
