THE FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE OF THE NURSERY. THE FOLLOWING is an extract from a letter written to the German Reform Messenger, at Chambersburgh, Penn.: A BENEFACTRESS.

A CAIRO POSSIBILITY. From the New Orleans Times, 31st. There have recently been very considerable accumulations of grain at Cairo which for want of river tonnage could not readily be moved.

WE are reminded of this fact, by the familiar recently expressed by a prominent citizen of St. Louis, of the possibility that Cairo may yet capture the grain trade which St. Louis has been so slow in properly patronizing.

But Cairo possesses other advantages which St. Louis can never have. It offers a convenient outlet to southern Illinois, southern Indiana, southern Ohio and to Kentucky; and in the course of time it no doubt would be provided with rail communication transverse southern Missouri, into the Indian territory, into Kansas, and thus forming connections with the entire railroad systems of Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa.

THE CONSIDERATIONS last mentioned are of the greatest importance. Below freezing point! Below shallow water! Below impassable sand-bars! Equally accessible with St. Louis--or at least might be made so--and with an outlet to the sea the year round, Cairo might well enter the list and compete with St. Louis for the grain business.
