



#### LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

NATIONAL BANKS.

Washington, May 3 .- Replying to an inquiry from the secretary of the treasury as to whether the fourth section of the act of June 30, 1874, was repugnant to the previous statutory provisions in preference to deposit of bonds by national banks, the solicitor-general, in an opinion approved by the attorney-general, sent to Secretary Sherman, says: "Upon the whole, I am of opinion that taken with its context, section 4 of the action of 1874 is for all purposes connected therewith repugnant to section 5,160, revised statutes, and all other previous legislation that requires national banks to have and maintain in the treasury of the United States a bond deposit to the amount of onethird of their capital.

CAPITAL NOTES.

WASHINGTON, May 3 .- The funeral of Gen. Samuel P. Heintzelman took place at 9 o'clock this morning. The remains were escorted to the Baltimore and Potomac railroad depot by a battalion of the Second artillery. An officer, non-commissioned officer and three privates of the Second artillery will accompany the body to Buffalo, where the interment takes place.

ing away from the unit and will vote nearly

solidly against Grant; also that Senator

Cameron is to be notified this week of the determination of the Philadelphia delegation to oppose Grant's nomination.

COMMITTEE EXPENSES. The various senate investigation committees have thus far expended the following amounts: Senate exodus committee, \$16,-525; Freedmen's bank investigation, \$9,079; Kellogg investigation, \$7,297; Ingalls investigation, \$6,408; select committee on removal of Northern Cheyennes and Ponca Indians, \$5,287; select committee to investigate reports, books and accounts of treasury department, \$35,471 committee on civil-service and retrench-

ment in Rhode Island, \$3,475.

THE MINT QUESTION. The house committee on coinage, weights and measures held a session to-day to hear further arguments in behalf of several cities claiming special advantages to the government in the location of a branch mint. Hon. Geo. R. Davis of Chicago, Ill., presented claims of that city in an elaborate argument. Senators from Nebraska were also heard at some length in favor of Omaha.

CHILIAN ADVICES.

A telegram was received from Panama at the legation of Chili which says the Chilian navy bombarded Callao on the 22d of April, causing heavy damages on shore and nearly destroying the Peruvian corvette Union. Lima is threatened by the Chilians, and great distress prevails in that city.

SANITARY PRECAUTIONS.

MEMPHIS, May 3.—About 15 miles of new sewers have been laid to date and house

the force of plumbers can work. Although unfavorable weather has prevented the completion of the entire system, all the business portion of the city, and the thickly settled area west of the bayou are substantially finished. Work in the comparatively clean soil and less thickly built region east of the bayou will be continued until June 1. Tests recently made, it is claimed, demonstrated the success of the new system of sewerage. With this important work practically accomplished and with the general sanitary improvement effected by labors of the past winter, the municipal authorities and local board of health are sanguine of the continuance during summer of the present healthy condition of Memphis. Published mortality tables for the past month show Memphis to rank seventh in point of healthmess among forty-six cities of over 30,000 population.
