LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

DR. TANNER.

NEW YORK, Aug. 1. --At noon to-day Dr. Tanner enters on the thirty-fifth day of his fast. He slept well the night previous and appeared refreshed this morning. He kept to the gallery all day, and was attacked with nausea and vomiting at different periods, throwing up a mixture of bile and mucus. A 2:45 his pulse was found to be 78; his temperature 98.4 and the dynamometer marked 82 kilometers. At 2:55 he got up to put on his clothes but could not do so as he had an attack of vomiting. At 7:35 and 8:40 this evening he had attacks of vomiting and at 9 p. m. retired to his cot and appeared to be sleeping. His medical attendants said he was in a feeble condition than yesterday; that attacks of nausea were unfavorable, and as they occurred after drinking a small quantity of fluid, it showed the doctor's stomach to be in a highly irritated condition. One of the medical men said Dr. Tanner was failing every day, but there was no doubt he would finish his self-imposed task. He thought the frequent attacks of vomiting showed that the coats of the stomach were somewhat inflamed. Dr. Tanner took nothing to-day but a little carbonated ice water.

CHURCH BUILDING DEDICATED.

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., August 1.--St. John's German Lutheran church, the oldest German society of this city, dedicated a good church edifice to-day in a new and fine location on East University avenue. The house is free from debt. Rev. A. Brauer of Beecher, Ill.; Rev. Lewis Zahn of Nokomis, Ill., and Rev. C. Prauer, pastor of the church, delivered sermons attended by large audiences.

SIGNING THE UTE TREATY.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 30.--Indians continue coming to the agency to sign the treaty, fearing that the chiefs who have signed will receive all of the \$60,000 appropriated by congress. The commission leave here next month for the Southern Ute agency, except Col. Meacham, who remains behind to take a census of the Uncompahgre Utes. Gen. Sheridan is expected here August 8.

THE DEMOCRACY WILL CARRY ILLINOIS.

From the State Register.

Messrs. Trumbull and Parsons, the democratic candidates for governor and lieutenant-governor are not men whose temperament is enthusiastic. They are not demonstrative nor given to wild speeches, false hopes or idle talk. They are, with the other candidates on the state ticket, making a close and careful canvass of the state in a plain business way and for the purpose of carrying it. There is no nonsense in the matter, no wild fire and, as we believe, no miscalculation. The Register last night received reports from both these gentlemen, as well as from other Democratic candidates, and the purpose of these reports is that the state of Illinois will be carried by the Democracy in November. The full vote of the party will vote the Democratic ticket, Mr. Starkel will bring to the support of the ticket the full strength of the German vote, Mr. Oberly will get a large accession from the laboring classes, honest Tom Butterworth is a tower of strength in Northwestern Illinois, and all the military tract is "whooping it up" for Harmon. The Democracy will carry the state in November.
