ORE BODY EIGHTY FEET IN WIDTH

Hanging Wall at Last Encountered on 14th Level of Old Dominion Mine

The big body of sulphide ore on the 14th level of the Old Dominion mine is just eighty feet wide. The end of the ore body which has been the talk of copper mining circles for the past six weeks was reached late Thursday night, when the hanging wall was encountered. It is understood that in the end of the cresscut the ore is considerably richer than has been previously encountered. In cresscut No. 3 there is fully twenty feet of ore so far, all of which runs better than 20 per cent. More information concerning conditions in the mine will be given in Sunday's issue of the Silver Belt.

NEED ADDITION FOR COUNTY JAIL

New Jail Is Filled with Prisoners and No Room for New Steel Cells

The county jail on the ground floor of the new Gila county courthouse is too small. There was a faint suspicion that this might be the case some time ago, but Sheriff Thompson is now sure of it. He came to this conclusion upon the recent arrival of the new steel cells which had been ordered, according to the specifications of the architect. The cell is a big double-decker affair and has compartments which will accommodate sixteen prisoners. There is no available space in the jail for the cell and the sheriff is seriously contemplating installing it in the attic of the courthouse.

Sheriff Thompson was out yesterday getting suggestions as to the best thing to do and received a variety of valuable hints. One business man who is suspected of having humanitarian proclivities suggested that the cell be erected on the roof and that it be surrounded with a sort of garden—he didn't say whether it should be of the flower or beer variety—and another thought that it would be a good plan to have the steel cage form the nucleus of a zoological garden. The sheriff is still undecided as to what to do with the structure.

There are now forty prisoners in the county jail, of all nationalities, colors and odors, many of whom are being held to await the action of the grand jury.

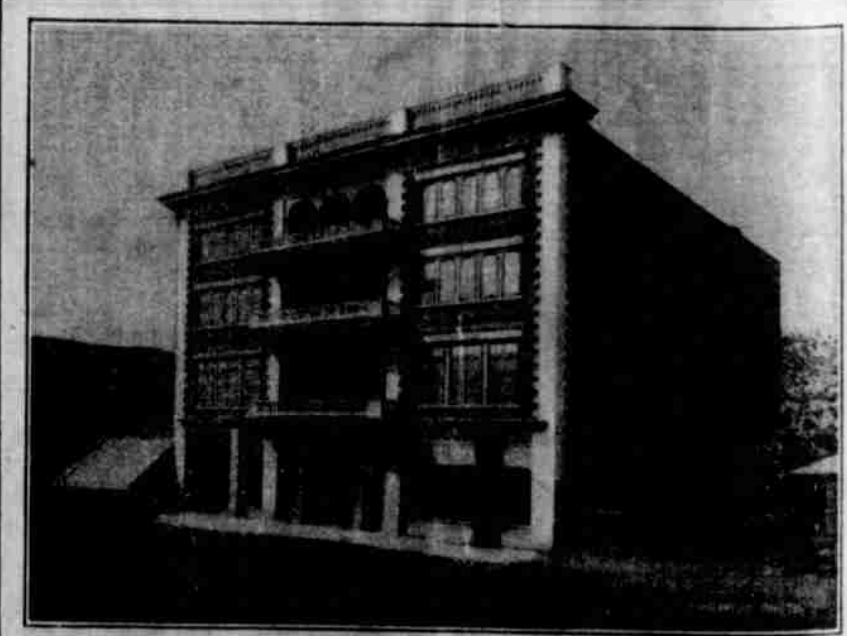
