MARKET STILL VERY DULL

Union Pacific Bond Issue Puts Damp on Whole Market—Stocks Are Not Pressed for Sale, but Close Was Weak—Metal Market All Right.

 GLOBE, May 10.—Walker Brothers of New York say: Market today opened steady and then developed some strength. Trading was light and traders didn't do much as they were waiting for crop reports. When these were published, market hesitated and then sold off. During the afternoon market was weak and dull. Before the close a slight rally took place, but was mainly covering by shorts.
 Paine of Boston says: Heavy issue of bonds by Union Pacific has put distinct damp on whole market, although pools tried hard to rally their specialties. They could not change public sentiment and steady liquidation came in all day. Close was weak and we feel moderately bearish at present. It is seldom safe to sell stocks short on a dull market, but on the whole we do not look for any advance in stocks at present and think it would be well to liquidate speculative holdings of long stocks and save interest charges for next few months. Metal market is all right, but prevailing bearish sentiment and extreme scarcity of buying orders makes market look more like a sell.

Rattlesnake Cure for Goitre
 The rattlesnake cure for goitre is not generally known to medical practice, but its efficacy is not doubted by some sufferers from this unsightly enlargement of the thyroid gland of the neck. A woman who used to live in Brooklyn is now taking the snake treatment at the hands of a snake fancier of some local fame in an up-state city. This fancier doesn't use rattlesnakes exclusively, but employs many small, slender garters in applying the treatment.
 The patient who is willing to try this most unusual remedy must submit to having a snake twine its coils around her neck. Meanwhile the snake fancier holds the snake by its head and neck. It is the practice to let the snake stay coiled around the enlarged neck for some little time. There is no danger of the snake choking a patient to death, for when the snake begins to constrict too tightly, a motion of the hand of the patient signals the snake man, who promptly squeezes the snake's head and the squeeze makes the snake uncoil or loosen his coils immediately. "Rattlesnake Pete," a local character in Rochester, employed the snake treatment for goitre for a great many years. Pete was bitten many times by rattlesnakes and the last time he was bitten he could hardly hold enough whisky to neutralize the effects of the venom. He barely pulled through. Since then he has recommended harmless snakes to patients suffering with goitre.—Brooklyn Eagle.

Horse Returned for His Master
 An old family horse named Socrates, owned by Ariel Cameron of East Norwalk, has often displayed almost human intelligence, but he outdid himself yesterday and almost lived up to his name. William Shea saw Socrates jogging home without his master.
 "Hey, Sock, where are you going all alone?" he sang out. The horse stopped and looked back. When he espied the empty seat, he turned around and retraced his steps for about two miles to a point where he had left his master at a store. Again he turned around and stopped at the curb.
 Mr. Cameron said he knew the horse would come back, and had waited for him.—South Norwalk dispatch to New York American.
