Current News of Busy Globe Told in Brevities

Installing Machinery.—C. M. Healy, master mechanic, is at Bellevue (Gibson's) installing two 202-horse power boilers, a 14x16 double drum hoist and a twelve-machine, two-stage cross compound compressor. Mr. Healy drafted the plans and is supervising the work.

Moving.—Barrett's drug store is being removed to its new home in the Amster block.

Store Improvement.—A twenty-five foot addition is being made to the store of William Ryan in anticipation of the receipt of an unusually heavy stock of holiday goods. A modern French plate glass front is also to be put in.

New Desk.—A handsome new desk for the use of Judge Nave in the district courtroom was received yesterday by the county officials.

New Real Estate Firm.—Moore & Feland, two well known and popular young men of the city, have opened a real estate and insurance agency in the room occupied by the Home Printing company. The young men are rustlers and will undoubtedly work up a handsome business.

Seventy-five Dollars for Beating Woman.—A. D. Brockwell, a local miner, was fined \$75 in Justice Thomas' court yesterday for striking a woman in the red light district. His friends are arranging for the payment of the fine.

Hitch Your Horse.—The ordinance requiring that all horses left standing on the streets shall be hitched is to be rigidly enforced in the future. Yesterday morning Mayor Sultan and Marshal Carico notified the policemen to arrest every driver who violated the provisions of the ordinance. The driver of one of Sultan's teams was the first victim and five more followed in quick succession. As the enforcement of this city law is something of an innovation, Judge Thomas assessed the costs, amounting to \$6.50, against the offenders.

To Install Towel Service.—Manager Frye of the Arizona Steam laundry will soon install an office towel supply service. Four dozen towel cabinets have been received and more are on the road. There has been considerable demand for a service of this kind and Manager Frye believes he can supply the growing demand. A charge of \$1.25 per month will be made, which price is the same paid for like service in large cities.

Keith of the Iris theater has received word from General Manager Tupper of the Iris circuit that the latter is now on the coast booking vaudeville attractions for the Iris chain of theaters. Arrangements have been made with the Considine-Sullivan circuit for their best attractions. This circuit is composed of thirty-nine theaters, which extend from coast to coast. The stage at the Iris will be enlarged at once to provide room for vaudeville acts.

WHERE DEATH HAS BEEN

Wesley C. Gillen

Wesley C. Gillen passed away yesterday morning at 6:30 o'clock at his home on South Hill street after suffering for several months with Bright's disease and complications. The deceased was a resident of Globe for over two years, coming here in April, 1925, to accept a position as machinist at the Old Dominion shops. Besides his wife and little daughter, he leaves to mourn his demise his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Gillen of Pierce City, Mo., two brothers, F. M. and J. W. Gillen, of the same place, and a sister, Mrs. N. C. George, who resides at Bellevue. The latter and the mother of the deceased were at his bedside when death came.

Mr. Gillen was born in Clark county, Illinois, July 10, 1875, and his parents moved to Missouri when he was 6 years of age. During the Spanish-American war he held a commission in a Missouri volunteer regiment and was a member of the Spanish War Veterans. He was also a member of the Odd Fellows lodge in Pierce City. During his residence in Globe he made many friends who greatly regret his sad death. The remains will be shipped tomorrow morning to Pierce City, Mo., for interment and will be accompanied by his wife and mother.
