

# GLOBE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TO ENLARGE

Commercial Body Will Take in Safford and Miami Branches

BOTH COMMUNITIES ARE ENTHUSIASTIC

J. M. Foster of Safford Will Boost Organization in Valley

Within the next two weeks, the Globe chamber of commerce will be extended and widened in its scope until it takes in both the Miami district and the entire Gila Valley as well, according to a plan which has the support of the people of both of the outside districts, as well as of the people of this city.

John M. Foster of the Foster Mercantile company of Safford yesterday held a conference with President F. P. Towle and Secretary R. A. Rohrabacker of the chamber of commerce, at which the plan of forming an auxiliary chamber of commerce in Safford and the valley generally, was seriously discussed.

Mr. Foster was highly pleased with the proposition and immediately on his return to Safford he will take up the plan with the business men of that town.

Within two weeks, a mass meeting will be called in Safford, at which Secretary Rohrabacker will be present and the organization of the Safford chamber of commerce should be accomplished without difficulty.

It is the plan of Secretary Rohrabacker and his plan is approved by Mr. Foster to form at Safford an auxiliary organization to the Globe chamber of commerce. The board of directors of the organization will also be members of the board of governors of the Globe chamber by virtue of affiliation with the Safford organization.

By carrying out this plan, the business men of Globe and Safford will be able to work together in a way that will be of great benefit to both communities. They will benefit by having a united commercial body and at the same time the people of the valley will be able to take advantage of being affiliated with the chamber of commerce, giving them strength which could not be secured from a strictly valley organization.

This same plan will be carried out in Miami and as soon as a meeting is called, Secretary Rohrabacker will arrange to be in attendance and will be of assistance in perfecting the organization.

Mr. Foster was highly enthusiastic over the plan of forming an auxiliary chamber of commerce at Safford, when he was in the Silver Belt yesterday.

The people of the valley were brought to a realization of the value of a chamber of commerce when the Globe chamber of commerce secured from the Randolph system a reduction in freight rates over the Gila Valley line.

They felt the need of concerted action upon the question of a petition for a grant of the low line right of way to the Southern Pacific through Box canyon. A petition was presented for the granting of the right of way, after much hard work on the part of individuals, but the matter would have been easier had there been a commercial organization in the valley.

It follows the business men of Safford are in sympathy with the movement to establish an auxiliary organization to the Globe chamber of commerce in the valley and that they are broad minded enough to realize that such an organization will work for their benefit as well as for the people of Globe. As the result, I do not believe that this plan will meet with any opposition, but my confidence is, I am sure that it will be speedily realized.

It is hoped to take the matter up with the business men of Safford at once and I believe that within two weeks a mass meeting will be called at which the organization will be formed.

CINCINNATI, February 9.—"I leave everything of which I die possessed to my beloved brother, Justus Goebel."

These words, constituting one of the shortest testamentary documents ever recorded in Kent county, Kentucky, the will of Arthur Goebel, were filed in Covington today. Justus Goebel, who by today's will becomes possessor of the combined fortune, lives in Phoenix. No estimate is made of the value of the estate. William Goebel, sworn in as governor of Kentucky on his deathbed in 1909, left his estate to his brother Arthur.

## LINCOLN BIRTHDAY A HOLIDAY

Public Offices and Probably Banks Will Observe Day in Globe

As the result of the proclamation of the governor, making the one hundred and first anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln a holiday, public offices and probably the banks of this city, will close next Saturday, February 12. Judge E. W. Lewis announced yesterday that there would be no session of the district court on Saturday. All the cases set for hearing on that day will be taken up on the following Monday. All of the other offices in the court house will probably close during the day.

There will be nothing in the way of a public observance of Lincoln's anniversary, although a few exercises may be held in the city schools on Friday.

## EVANGELISTS WILL HAVE GATHERING AT EL PASO

Important Meeting Would Initiate Evangelism of the World

EL PASO, Texas, February 9.—A meeting of wide importance to all churchmen throughout the southwest has been arranged for February 27, 28 and March 1, in this city. It is one of a series of such meetings being held throughout the country under the direction of what is known as the Laymen's Missionary Movement, having as its motto and watchword, "The Evangelization of the World in this Generation." The El Paso meeting is designed to cover all that territory as far east as Midland and Alpine in Texas, as far north as Santa Fe, N. M., and as far west as Douglas, Ariz. The city of El Paso is preparing to care for 1,500 laymen and the lectures, speeches and addresses will be by men of national reputation. On the opening night a banquet will be spread, to which every layman is invited, and at which some of the subjects pertaining to the Laymen's Missionary Movement will be discussed. Every evangelical church in the territory mentioned is urged to send a delegation of its leading laymen to this meeting. It is proposed to so arouse the missionary spirit in the churches of this southwestern country that each one shall become a center of missionary influence under the leadership of its lay membership to the end that the gospel shall be preached in every part of the globe before the passing of the present generation. It is a great undertaking, fraught with far-reaching results, and the co-operation of all Christian men is earnestly solicited. Each church is requested to take the matter up at once and arrange for a representative attendance of its membership. PHOENIX, Ariz., February 9.—The department of the interior has ordered the re-appraisal of all lots in the townsite of Parker, on a showing that the valuations which have been established are too low and that two of the former appraisers made entries after their appraisal. Many lots are now in process of final proving. According to announcement the re-appraisal will begin at once and will be finished before final proofs would have been fully made, under the former appraisal, so that no time may be lost to settlers. The new board of appraisers is made up of F. C. DeZendorf, Raymond Satterwhite, special agents of the land office and Charles E. Kelsey of the San Jose Indian bureau.

## SULTAN BURGLARS ESCAPED WITH PLUNDER

Further Investigation Discloses Loss of Many Pocket Knives

As the result of a careful inspection of Sultan Brothers' department store yesterday morning, it was discovered that the burglars who entered that establishment Tuesday evening escaped with several dozen pocket knives and with possibly a few undergarments as well.

When the store was inspected by Harry Sultan, immediately after the discovery of the burglary, the stock was apparently untouched and a complete investigation was not made. Ordinarily as had been the intruders, however, a more complete investigation by daylight revealed the fact that they had been in the store a longer time than had at first been apparent and that they had paid particular attention to the cutlery department.

Whether the burglars escaped with their loot before they were disturbed, or whether they secreted themselves inside the store and made their escape later, is not known. As only a small amount of plunder was secured, however, it is thought that Mr. Sultan's entrance caused the intruders to decamp before they had completed their work.

A woman living in the rear of the store, saw two men, who are described as being dark and heavy set, emerge from the rear of the store during the

evening, but as she thought they were employed at the establishment, she did not inform the officers.

The county authorities made an investigation of the burglary yesterday, without being able to run down the thieves.
