PACKAGES MISSING FROM CAR ARE LOCATED

Damaging Evidence Discovered Against Murphy in County Jail

The burglary of a refrigerator car in the railroad yards Friday night resulted in the loss of three packages of merchandise, two of which were yesterday recovered by Constable W. G. Duncan.

Both packages had been cached across the creek from the railroad yards. One was a case of envelopes shipped to J. E. McNeil and the other was a case of tinware intended for Clarence T. Seipp.

A careful checking of the contents of the car disclosed the fact that in addition to these two packages, a barrel of merchandise was also missing. This has not as yet been recovered.

Joe Murphy, one of two men who were seen at the car by Watchman Harry Temple, has not been formally charged with burglary as yet, but this action will probably be taken tomorrow. A tin car seal was yesterday found in the store inside the county jail, where Murphy is confined and with this evidence against the accused, the authorities are confident of fastening the crime upon him.

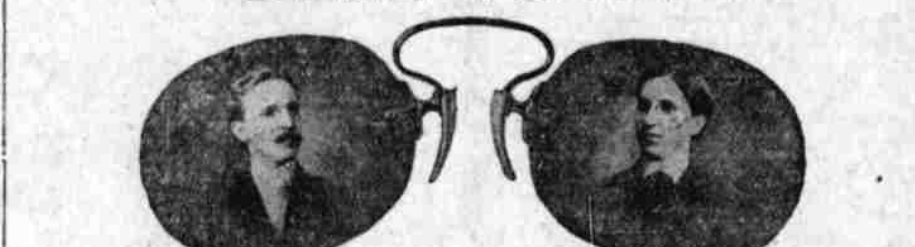
