WOMAN TALKED TO DEATH BY FRIENDS

Freak Legend on Tombstone of Illinois Woman

CARLYLE, Ill., February 19.—This county is entitled to a place in the freak tombstone hall of fame of the country. A modest stone slab marks the grave in the Pritchett cemetery, in the north-eastern part of the county, which conveys the information that the person buried there was "talked to death by friends."

The wife of Thomas Phillips, who lived in that community years ago, was, it is understood, not an expert housekeeper. Women neighbors insisted upon advising her as to her domestic duties, adding little pointers on how she should treat her husband.

This was not appreciated by her husband. When she died he declared that those unsought lectures had much to do with her death, hence the inscription on the stone that marks her grave.

HELD IN MEXICO ON CHARGE OF BIGAMY

Case Not Bailable and Suspended Held in Jail

MEXICO CITY, February 19.—George Robbins, a mining man, said to be well known in California and Arizona, is in custody awaiting extradition on the charge of bigamy.

Robbins was arrested at the request of the American embassy, said to have been made at the instance of the California authorities.

Robbins and his bride came a week ago. He is alleged to have another wife in California, which he denies. The charge against Robbins is not bailable under the Mexican law, and he will be held until the papers arrive.

LABOR NOTES

Blacksmiths of Toronto, Canada, recently formed union.

Shoe workers of Arroyo, Porto Rico, have formed a union.

Plans have been formed for organizing all labor in Santurce and San Juan, Porto Rico.

The Machinists' union in Milwaukee has gained more than one hundred members since August.

The Printing Pressmen and Assistants' union has endorsed the proposition to establish a home for consumptives.

Efforts are being made to form an organization of ear men at Portland, Me., to be affiliated with the Brotherhood of Railroad Car Men of America.

Successful efforts have been made to organize new locals of the Bridge and Structural Iron Workers of America at Lincoln, Neb., and Des Moines, Iowa.

Robert J. Gloecking of Toronto, Ont., president of the International Brotherhood of Bookbinders, reports the organization in a highly prosperous condition.

The independent labor party at Toronto, Canada, is conducting an organization campaign, which, according to its officers, will be in splendid shape to take part in the next municipal campaign.

The directors of the Lincoln, Neb., Labor Temple association have closed a deal for the purchase of a two-story brick building on a lot fifty by one hundred feet. The purchase price was \$18,000 on reasonable terms.

It has been decided recently that the Massachusetts legislature be petitioned

to enact a law fixing the minimum wage at \$2.25 a day for all state laborers, and particularly for those employed by the water, sewer and park boards.

A statewide and active campaign to secure the passage of an employers' liability law in Illinois, similar to the one which has received the endorsement of many officials of the American Federation of Labor will soon be in full swing.

The sailors' union of the Pacific, which has already donated \$13,000 to the striking sailors of the Great Lakes, has voted to donate \$20,000, which may be drawn in one sum or in such sums as the strike committee may see fit to draw.

It is estimated by competent experts that about two thousand operatives in all have gone out on strike in Fall River, Fitchburg, Fisherville, North Adams and at several other points in Massachusetts because of a reduction in wages caused by the new fifty-six-hour law.

In the referendum vote for general secretary of the Journeymen Tailors' union of America, John B. Lennon, of Bloomington, who has held the position for twenty-three years, was defeated by E. J. Bruns of Cleveland. Lennon attributes his defeat to his persistent activity against saloons.

According to the bureau of vital statistics of the United States government, American bakers and confectioners have a death rate due to consumption of 250.1 per 100,000. The death rate from pneumonia amounts to 117.4 per 100,000. From these two causes, both growing out of their occupation, their death rate is 367.5 per 100,000. The average death rate among all people is 110 per 100,000.

WHEREAS, a general City Election will be held in the City of Globe on Monday, the 23rd day of May, 1910, for the election of a Mayor, Members of the Common Council from each ward of said City, and other elective officers of said City; and

WHEREAS, a general City Primary will be called for the nomination of such officers, to be held on the 23rd day of April, 1910, agreeable to the provisions of Chapter 24 of the Laws

of Arizona, approved March 10th, 1909; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Chapter 13 of the Laws of Arizona, which became a law on the 10th day of March, 1909, prescribing the qualifications of electors, and providing for their registration a re-registration of electors residing in said City is necessary to be had prior to said election.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that a re-registration of all electors residing within the City of Globe be and the same is hereby ordered and directed, such re-registration to begin as soon hereafter as may be, and not later than ten days from and after this date, and to continue until the 13th day of May, 1910.

Every male citizen of the United States, and every male citizen of Mexico who shall have elected to become a citizen of the United States under the Treaty of Peace exchanged and ratified at Queretaro on the 30th day of May, 1848, and the Gadsden Treaty of 1854, of the age of twenty-one years or more, shall have been a resident of the Territory of Arizona for one year, and of the City of Globe and of the Ward in which he claims his vote for thirty days next preceding said 23rd day of May, 1910, and who, not being prevented by physical disability from so doing, is able to read the Constitution of the United States in the English language in such manner as to show that he is neither prompted nor reciting from memory, and is able to write his own name, and who is not an idiot, an insane person, or a person convicted of a felony, is a qualified elector in said City, and is entitled to registration therein in accordance with the ordinances of said City and the laws of Arizona.

The City Clerk of the City of Globe is hereby designated as the Registration officer of said City to have charge of and conduct said registration, and there shall also be appointed and designated such additional registration officers of said City as the Common Council thereof shall from time to time deem it necessary and proper to appoint, and the place of registration shall be at the City Clerk's office, and at such other places as the Council may see fit hereafter to designate.

All qualified electors may register at said Clerk's office, or at such other places as the Council may designate, by making affidavit in writing before said Clerk, or before such registration officer, wherein must be stated and shown every fact entitling such person to registration, and also the facts required to be stated on the great register (except the date and number), but no person shall be registered who is not able to read the Constitution of the United States as above and to sign his own name; and each elector registering shall be entitled to and shall upon demand receive a certificate of registration from the officer registering him.

Only the names of persons registered prior to the 13th day of April, 1910, shall be entered on the poll lists used at the Primary Election of April 23rd; and persons offering to vote at said primary shall not be permitted to vote thereat unless their names appear on said poll lists, or unless upon production of a certificate of registration showing registration by them in said City prior to their offering to vote on the day of said primary and subsequent to the date of the passage of this resolution.

The City Clerk of the City of Globe is hereby directed to publish a copy of this resolution for ten days in the Arizona Daily Silver Belt as soon after the passage and adoption hereof as copy can be prepared for publication, and not later than ten days from this date; and also to publish a copy hereof in said

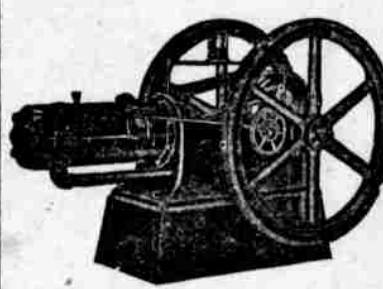
